The award winning D25 cel- This year's design was ebrated her 10-year anniversary in the Newport Beach Christmas Boat Parade this past December. Each year I've put together the smallest entry in the 'Grand Daddy of all Boat Parades' with much help from my friends in the Balboa Power Squadron.

This latest year was no exception. I can usually come up with an idea for the boat design at some point during the year, but making it happen takes all hands on deck.

This year we again one a first place—blue ribbon award: Best Special Effects and Animation. In winning this award, little D25 (an 11 foot dingy) was competing against every other boat entered in the parade from 30, 40 and even 80 foot + yachts.

It is quite an honor. D25 also received a bit of press attention this year as The OC Register and The Daily Pilot both had feature articles and photos of the project.

D25 uses twin generators to provide 30 amps of 120 and animation computers. 'Snoopy Christmas' and featured Snoopy's award winning doghouse holiday display contrasted with Charlie Brown's sad Christmas Tree with a single red ornament. The animation controllers would bend the tree under the weight of the glass ornament as was originally depicted in the classic Peanuts Christmas TV Special. Of course the D25 sound machine was turned on and Joe Cool



was spinning the Linus and Lucy theme song for the evening.

Skippered by Peter Barbour for 5 consecutive nights of 14 mile voyages, that's another 70 miles under the keel this past year. Over the last ten years I've put over 750 miles on the dingv!

CoOp Charting News

You may have heard that NOAA is discontinuing the printing of traditional nautical charts, as of April 13, 2014. However, NOAA will continue to provide the nation's charts in a variety of forms. Therefore USPS involvement in submitting chart corrections to NOAA under the Cooperative Charting Program has not changed. Submitting chart corrections will help NOAA to keep all chart information current.

In order to provide up-to-date nautical charts to the boating community, NOAA will provide charts as **PDF files** (Portable Document Format). Commercial enterprises can use these files to offer new navigation products and services. Between October 22, 2013 and January 22, 2014, NOAA is soliciting comments in regards to these PDF files and are free to download during this period. The information are current at the time a user will download them and are available to anyone to view or print them. The web site is *nauticalcharts.noaa.gov/pdfcharts*.

Furthermore nautical charts will continue to be available as **"Print-on-Demand"** (POD) products. Again, these charts will be up-to-date at the time of printing. They are available for a charge, are water and UV tolerant and stand up to repeated folding, writing, and erasing. They can be purchased at *nauticalcharts.noaa.gov/pod/pod.htm*.

As I have written before, NOAA provides PDFs of **BookletCharts**, which are nautical charts in booklet form, downloadable for printing from home computers. It is convenient and free, available at *nauticalcharts.noaa.gov/staff/bookletcharts.htm*.

Electronic Navigational Charts (ENC) are produced from vector databases. They support realtime navigation as well as collision and grounding avoidance. ENCs are used by many computer navigation programs and mobile apps. These charts can be zoomed and will show greater detail in the zoomed area. They are updated with weekly Notice to Mariners corrections and are available for free downloads from the Coast Survey website at *nauticalcharts.noaa.gov/mcd/enc/ index.htm*.

Also **Raster Navigational Charts** (RNC) are being offered for free. These charts are digital images of the traditional paper charts and are used in a variety of electronic charting systems. Also these charts can be zoomed, however they will only show an enlarged picture of the zoomed area. No greater detail than what is shown on these charts will be displayed. They are also updated with weekly Notice



I grew up in Michigan where fresh water lakes encompassed the region. And boating was our family recreation. We tried sailing but it seemed to take forever and we found it a little difficult to ski behind the sails. Well, power and speed seemed to be our style.

Having just recently becoming a member of the power squadron brought back memories of my father. It was about 60 years ago that I remember my Father was a member of the Power Squadron. He taught a few classes too but I can't remember which ones. It was probably on reading markers because we knew how to read every marker on the great lakes back then.

I bought my first boat in California in the early 70's, it was a Hobie Cat 16. This boat had a lot of speed, but it required a lot of work setting it up and taking it down. For me it meant back to power boating. Several power boats
