Carl Tesreau was speaker at the September 17 dinner meeting of the Grand Lake Sail and Power Squadron. Carl has been with the Monkey Island Fire Department for 6 years as a volunteer and 11 years as chief. The ISO (Insurance Service Office) Public Protection Class is the one to ten rating system for fire departments for purposes of setting home owners insurance rates. When Tesreau took over as Chief of the Monkey Island Fire Department, the district rating was seven. With a lot of hard work and training of personnel the rating is now four which puts Monkey Island in the top 7% of fire departments nationally. This bodes well for the residents of Monkey Island.

Carl also spoke about the equipment including a fire boat operated by the MIFD and the area covered by their jurisdiction. He also talked about how they work with other fire departments and ambulance services in adjoining coverage areas.

#### Boarman Youth Poster Contest

The USPS Youth Poster Contest Awards are given for squadrons and districts to promote youth appreciation of the water and that safe boating is fun boating with their local youth.

The Contest is open to all children ages 6 - 14. A First place award of \$150, second place award of \$100 and third place of \$75 is given in three age groups: 1) 6 - 8 years, 2) 9 - 11 years and 3) 12 - 14 years. This year's theme is "When You Boat Be Ready to Float...Wear It".

#### Deadline for Entries

Each Squadron and District should establish their own deadline prior to year end. The list of District winners should be sent by 01 January to youth@usps.org. All winning posters are then to be hand-delivered on Thursday of the National Annual Meeting week to the Youth Poster Contest

#### Contest Rules

- Each district may submit one poster in each age category. Squadron entries must be judged at the district level prior to being submitted to national. The judging deadline for each squadron and district is to be set locally.
- 2. The entry may be vertical or horizontal in orientation.
- The entry must be on poster board or paper 15 x 20 or 14 x 22 inches.
- Participants may sketch the design lightly with a pencil, but the end result must be a color. poster
- Professional illustrations, copyrighted material, purchased or computer generated art may not be used.
- Do not fold the poster
- The poster will be judged for the idea presented more than artistic ability.
- One entry is allowed per person. All entries become the property of United States Power Squadrons<sup>®</sup>, which reserves the right to display

- or otherwise use the submission for future reproduction.
- 9 It is important that the contest entry form be completed in full, legibly printed and adhered to the back of the poster

#### Squadron Contests

All posters should first be judged at the squadron level with the 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>st</sup>0 and 3<sup>st</sup> place winners in each category then submitted for judging at the District. Many Squadrons offer cash awards in their competitions.

Posters should be submitted to the individual designated by the District Commander. Districts should monitor all entries to make sure that they meet contest requirements regarding size and media used.

Only first-place winners in each age category can be entered into judging at the National level.

Each District should determine when and where their judging will occur, i.e., Spring or Fall Conference, C & R, etc., based on area needs. However, the National judging will occur at the National Annual Meeting each year.

#### The National Contest

The Grand Prize winner and two runner-up posters in each age group will be displayed at the Annual Meeting. After judging at the National level is completed, non-winning entries will be returned to the respective districts. All participants at the national level will receive participants at the hallocidal level will receive certificates of appreciation signed by the Chief Commander with cash awards sent to the District Commander for presentation to the winners. #### **Guidelines for Drawing a Poster**

#### What is a poster?

- Gives a message that matches/relates to contest theme.
- · Uses words and pictures.

#### What makes a good poster?

- Catches your eye
- Easy to read, quickly.
  Gets the message across.

#### How do you create a good poster?

- Plan your idea.
- Make several practice pictures and choose the best one for the final poster
- Decide on either vertical or horizontal orientation.
- Keep images and pictures simple; few objects are best
- Make pictures large; space should be filled. Solid, bright, dark colors are preferred.
- Make letters large and easy to read. Remember, letters are part of the total design.
- Make your own letters bold and thick no purchased lettering allowed. Colors should be dark and bright even iridescent or 3D.
- Use the correct size poster paper (15" x20" or 14" x 22").

#### Questions to ask yourself before you submit your poster for judging:

- Does the poster fill the requirements of the contest is the poster size either 15" x 20" or 14" x 22"?
- Is the poster easy to read?

  Do the images and letters stand out?
- Is the spacing used wisely?

  Does the poster clearly show the message?
- Are there any spelling errors?
- Is the poster drawn and colored neatly?
- Does the poster look original, something that will catch the judges' eyes?

Remember, you MAY NOT USE any copyright material (e.g. Snoopy, Sponge Bob, Ronald McDonald, etc).

You MAY NOT USE any computer generated art work or purchased materials (e.g. stickers).

#### Promoting boating safety in grand style

To celebrate National Safe Boating Week, Grand Lake Sail & Power Squadron/31 dedicated the five life jacket loaner stations it installed on Grand Lake at Grand Lake State Park. The stations are located at Grand Lake State Park, Honey Creek State Park, Twin Bridges State Park, Wolf Creek boat ramp and the Elk River boat ramp.

Boaters can borrow the life jackets from a loaner station free of charge and return them later. Squadron member Janet Sloan promoted the life jacket loaner station idea and researched designs.

Early in 2014, the squadron received a Sea Tow Foundation grant for life jackets and a loaner station, but the loaner station design was unsuitable for conditions on Grand Lake. With the foundation's permission, the squadron developed a new design

using fencing materials for the station. In August 2014, Janet met with Bill Keefer, Grove City manager; Brian Edwards, chief of the Grand River Dam Authority Marine Police; and then-Squadron Commander Gene Pett at the Grove City boat launch on Wolf Creek, the location of the first loaner station. After approval and a scan for underground utilities, squadron members Larry Stout, Al Scarriot and David Sloan installed the station in September.

Squadron members Ken Moore and Ken Noteboom worked with state park officials, Grand River Dam Authority and others to install four more loaner stations in time for National Safe Boating Week. They will manage the loaner program, replacing life jackets and performing maintenance as needed. They also installed fishing line recycling containers to prevent aquatic life and boat engines from being harmed by waste or lost fishing line. -David Sloan



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## Do You Know?

#### Article 1



Propellers are designated by their diameter and pitch. Thus an 18 X 14 propeller has a diameter of 18 inches and a pitch of 14 inches. Pitch is the distance the propeller would travel with no slip through a solid substance in one complete revolution. The diameter and pitch should be matched to the hull shape and weight of the boat as well as to the horsepower of the engine. A mismatch will produce vibration, decreased efficiency and excessive wear of the strut bearings and even damage the propeller.

Propellers are either right hand or left hand, turning clockwise or counterclockwise. A turning propeller will pull the boat's stern in the direction of the rotation. Knowing how it turns can help when maneuvering the boat in close quarters. Many boats with one motor now have twin props with one turning clockwise and the other counter clockwise to negate the side pull of the single propeller.

#### Article 2

Stability of a boat is the ability of it to return to its original position after being disturbed. There are two types: Static stability which is the ability when the boat is at rest in still water and dynamic stability which is the same ability when the vessel is moving through the water and is subjected to external forces such as wind and waves.

There are two forces involved with stability referred to as the center of gravity (downward force) and center of buoyancy (upward force). The center of gravity is a fixed point and its location is determined by the way in which the boat has been constructed and how it is loaded. The center of buoyancy shifts sideways when the boat lists or rolls and the distance between these forces is called the "righting arm". When the center of gravity passes outboard of the center of buoyancy, the righting arm becomes negative and the boat will capsize.

#### Article 3

Changing boat speed to reduce wake should be made well in advance since it takes at least several boat lengths for your wake to settle down. When slowing down from a planning speed to a displacement speed, the boat will go into a semi-displacement action generating increased wake. The boat's wake will be reduced after it reaches the slower displacement speed. Another option to control wake is operating at planning speed when the area is safe and not congested. Be considerate and reduce your wake when passing boats tied to a dock, rafted alongside each other, fishing or at anchor. Remember the 150 feet no wake requirement on Grand Lake for docks.

#### Article 4

For a comfortable ride in your boat, proper trim is important. If you have an outboard or I/O motor you can use it to help trim the boat by adjusting the angle of the drive to the transom. This is done with a switch usually located on the throttle control.

When you are attempting to get a boat up on plane, the trim button will be pressed down or in depending on how yours is labeled. This will help lift the stern of the boat and keep the bow down. This helps to counteract the natural tendency for the bow to rise. Give sufficient power to the boat to put it on plane. If your boat has trim tabs, lower them too which will help get your boat on plane quicker.

As soon as the boat begins to plane, you will feel a sudden change in the boat attitude and speed. The bow will settle down to a more level position and speed will increase. At this point ease back the throttle to achieve a speed that is comfortable while maintaining plane. You may then adjust your trim, and your trim tabs, if equipped, as needed depending on your boat and prevailing conditions.
