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MESSAGE FROM THE DISTRICT COMMANDER

I have just returned from the Fall Governing Board meeting in Bellevue, Washington that I attended on your behalf. It was a productive and very informative meeting and I want to pass on some of the highlights of the information we obtained.

The meeting took place in the Bellevue, Washington, a wonderful suburb of the City of Seattle, located on Lakes Washington and Sammamish near Puget Sound. It is really a boater's paradise. So much water, so many boats!!

District 4 was represented by 25 members who traveled across the country to attend the meetings and bring back loads of information for our members. In addition to participating in the working sessions, we also had fun being in the beautiful Pacific Northwest, some of us for the first time. Needless to say, the seafood is fresh and plentiful (even if they do throw it around at the Pike's Place market) and the Dungeness crabs are just the best! Many members took advantage of the destination by making trips to the San Juan Islands, Victoria and Vancouver, British Columbia, and even on to Alaska. If one has never been to the Pacific Northwest, it is certainly worth planning such a trip in the future.

Following are some highlights from the Fall Governing Board meeting:

1. The Bylaws have been changed unifying all classes of membership. This was done to simplify the membership structure

for USPS and make all members of USPS more equal in their rights and privileges. ie: combining Active and Family member classes. There are now four classes of members, namely, Active, Apprentice, Corporate, and Honorary members.

2. Membership is Job # 1. Membership must remain a top priority for the organization and to help address the issue emphasis has been placed on expanding the Cyber Squadron program by registering the on line students of Americas Boating Course as USPS members. There are now approximately 900 Cyber Squadron members on the roles now. This presents a real opportunity for Squadron growth by reaching out to these students and encouraging them to transfer to a local squadron. The key component in this effort is the Squadron Public Contact person in each squadron. The Cyber member will be referred to that contact at the 4 closest squadrons.
3. Retaining existing members is very important also. A membership renewal reminder will now be sent out electronically. Email messages are now sent to these members whose

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anniversary month is approaching.

4. A dues increase has been approved. A \$2.00 dues increase for a single active member will be effective in the Spring of 2011(for the 2012 dues year). The new dues rate for an active member is \$41.00: for a family unit headed by a regular active member the dues rate will be \$61.50, and the dues rate for family units headed by a life member will be \$20.50.
5. Effective this year 2010, electronic merit marks certifications will be sent out via email to all recipients, except first timers and those members who do not have an email address. It is estimated that this change will save USPS approximately \$10,000.00 annually.
6. A new major initiative is underway with the Brunswick Corporation, America's largest boat builder/dealer. Participating Brunswick dealers will purchase a brand display and educational materials from USPS. Approximately 50 boat dealers with squadrons nearby have been identified for the initial distribution. Squadrons will have the opportunity to teach ABC3 and Seminars in the boat dealer facilities, and to use the dealer's boats for on the water training.
7. Educationally, major emphasis is being placed on training certifiers and those who can demonstrate on the water skills. We now have over 500 members so qualified. We are beginning to certify Inland Navigators and preparing to certify the next level, Coastal Navigator.
8. The USPS boat insurance program and Travelers insurance program have announced additional discounts

exclusively for USPS members.

Members who complete various levels of the Boat Operator Certification (BOC) program will now qualify for the following insurance discounts:

Inland Navigation	2.5%
Coastal Navigation	2.5%
Advanced Coastal Nav	5.0%
Offshore Navigation	5.0%

These discounts are in addition to the 23% credit available for the completion of USPS safety courses and the annual Vessel Safety Check, bringing the total credit to 38%.

9. Marketing the educational program and the entire organization remains a top priority. We are now able to offer any and all of our programs to the public. Squadrons may also offer 6 months free membership for these students completing the ABC3 course.

USPS continues to expand the Leadership Development program being offered to all members. The DAO and SAO course has been a success and is now being given at 6 selected locations throughout the country. It will again be given at the Annual Meeting in Fla. In Feb. 2011. The next level course DXO/SXO will be offered also at the Annual meeting with the AO course as a prerequisite. Both courses focus on practical leadership skills and address such topics as attitudes, leadership styles, team building and goal setting. Sections regarding USPS structure and conducting effective meeting round out the program. All members are urged to attend these professional training sessions.

As you can see with all these changes and new developments happening, it is an exciting time to be a member of this dynamic organization. Here in District 4, it continues to be a

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productive, educational, and fulfilled year. Join with us as the party continues.....It's 5o'clock somewhere!!

The Most Reverend Archbishop Herbert M. Groce, Jr. passed away on Saturday, September 20, 2010, following a long illness. For many years he was friend and beloved Chaplin for USPS squadron, district and national.

Bishop Groce, or Herb as he was often addressed, was a 38 year member of USPS and was a familiar sight at most D4 conferences for at least 25 years.

Perhaps he was best known in D4 for his wonderful deep voice giving special meaning to the sermons he preached at the annual Memorial Services in Staten Island. His friendly greetings and jolly manner, his participation in squadron, district and national, made him friend to all. He served as National Chaplin during the years of 2006/7 & 8 until poor health required him to retire. His Saturday evening services at the annual National Meetings and at the Governing Board Meetings will be fondly remembered by many.

Herb was a man of many interests and in all he rose to the top ranks. He was an archbishop for the Episcopal Church of the United States. He had his doctorate degree in theology, and was ordained as a priest at the Cathedral of St. John the Devine in New York City.

He was a member of the American Legion Post 91 of Wharton, NJ, Grand Chaplin of the F&AM of New York State, and Chaplin for the Knights Templar International. He was also active nationally in the Boy Scouts of America.

Archbishop Herb Groce served as vice president of the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey and as director of operations for the Lincoln Center of Performing Arts in NYC. All this and much more, yet he always had time to stop and say "Hello" in that wonderful deep basso profundo voice.

His immediate family included this wife Linda, two sons, three daughters, and six grandchildren.

He was a gentleman and a Prince among men. Oh, how we will miss him.



A Bit of History:

What makes Twin Lights 'historic'?

Stating that a building or place is officially historic is not as straightforward as you might think. Surely, Twin Lights is historic, and without doubt nearby Stone Church, Fort Hancock and the Sandy Hook Lighthouse are all historic as well, but why? Their historic designations are regulated by the US Department of the Interior through the National Register of Historic Places, the official list of such places throughout the county. To be considered for listing on the National Register, a property must be at least 50 years old and have significance because it:

- A. Is associated with important events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history; or
- B. Is associated with the lives of persons significant in our past; or
- C. Possesses architectural value that embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction or that represent the work of a master, or that possess high artistic values, or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction; or
- D. Possesses archeological material that has yielded, or may be likely to yield, information important in prehistory or history.

As you can see, Twin Lights is an example of a property that has significance under more than just one category. Twins Lights' strong connection with navigation, the development of maritime trade in the US and Marconi and wireless transmission, just to mention a few aspects, sets it apart. Because its history is so extraordinary, the National Park Service has bestowed an additional distinction upon Twin Light, namely that of a National Historic Landmark (NHL). NHLs have the highest level of historic designation and are properties of national significance. Of New Jersey's four first-order lighthouses, a group that includes

Barnegat, Absecon, and Cape May, only Twin Lights is a NHL.

At times, National Register status is accompanied with misconceptions. Such status does not guarantee preservation, for example. The federal or state government cannot prevent private owners from significantly altering or even demolishing their National Register listed properties. This type of safeguard would rely on a local preservation ordinance. Moreover, with respect to publically owned listed properties, National Register status does not require a government to maintain them properly. The recognition provided by the National Register of Historic Places they may be enjoyed by future generations. Get storm smart

Don't let bad weather sneak up on you

During the tropical storm season, mariners should monitor NOAA radio, the National Hurricane Center's website and other public weather forecasts while being on the lookout for warning signs of approaching storms.

Warning signs

Abnormally large swells that are far apart, with a period of 10 to 15 seconds, may foretell the approach of a tropical storm or hurricane.

As a hurricane approaches, thin, wispy cirrus clouds appear and the barometer starts a long, slow fall. The cirrus clouds thicken into a veil of cirrostratus clouds, altostratus clouds form beneath them, and light rain begins.

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Then, the barometer falls more rapidly, wind gusts increase, dark cumulonimbus clouds appear, and rainsqualls become more frequent.

Take action

When a storm approaches offshore, boaters need to do some quick analysis to determine whether they can make it to safe harbor.

If forced to remain offshore in a storm, the captain should try to get to the storm's navigable semicircle, which in the northern latitudes is on the left side of the storm's path facing the direction the storm is moving toward. The winds aren't as strong because the storm's forward motion is subtracted from the wind speed; however, the seas remain extremely dangerous.
