Navigation

Bristol Harbor, between Bristol Neck on the east end and Popasquash Neck on the west, is in a cove about 2 miles long and 1.3 miles wide at its southern end, narrowing to 0.4 mile wide at its northern end. The harbor proper, the northern part of the cove, has depths of 15 to 17 feet.

Bristol is situated on the eastern side of the harbor. In approaching the harbor the most prominent mark is Mount Hope Bridge. Also prominent are the navigation lights, a stone tower, a stack, and an elevated tank on high ground back of the town. The town has bus service. A ferry operates daily from Bristol to Prudence Island.

Usher Rocks, about 0.7 mile northeastward of Popasquash Point, are bare at low water. A buoy is eastward of the rocks and a lighted bell buoy is on the western side of the western passage to the harbor.

Tides

The mean range of tide at Bristol is 4.1 feet. Depths alongside the piers and wharves range from 9 to 13 feet.

Bristol Art Museum

The Bristol Art Museum (BAM) offers a variety of art exhibits each year in its new home, a renovated 1860s carriage house on the grounds of the historic Linden Place mansion. The entrance is off Wardwell Street, and the conversion of the interior space has created three galleries on the first floor, with five artist studios and a multi-purpose room for classes and lectures on the second floor. BAM was established in 1963 by three local women and has offered exhibits to the public for 50 years. For the past several years, the museum has also offered year-round exhibits for local and emerging artists at Rogers Free Library across the street at 525 Hope St. BAM also sponsors an annual outdoor art exhibit, "Art Al Fresco," on the last Sunday of July along the fence at Linden Place and participates in Art Night in Bristol and Warren on the last Thursday of each month from May to September. Outreach with other cultural organizations to promote programs on the arts is part of BAM's mission. The museum is a 501@(3) nonprofit organization managed by an all-volunteer board. The Bristol Art Museum was honored as a winner of the Rhody Award for its dedication to preserve a building, preserve the future of the museum and to enhance the community.
