


FAMILY SEA STORIES



While visiting family and friends I came upon 2 items which intrigued me: a photo in an old album and a list of ships a relative of mine had crewed on, beginning in 1/7/1898 in Denmark to his retirement in San Francisco in 1945. Later, I remembered a photo in one of my Dad's old albums which I went back and found.

It struck me, why not start a column where LRGV members can display nautical family history? Below are the 2 pictures I found. Sadly, we don't have any more information about the pictures, who, when, where, than what I have written on the pictures.

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The list of ships Mogens Andreasen crewed was provided to me by Lore Andreasen. I am trying to find out more information about the ships on the list but it is slow going. 2 ships, however, are easy to find information on: the Montebello and the Falls of Clyde.

The Falls of Clyde jumped out at me because I have been on her – in Honolulu where she is birthed at the Honolulu Maritime Center. She is owned by the Bishop Museum and is on the National Register of Historic Places. She has been open to the public since 1968 but now faces a very sad fate: being sunk-unless 32 million dollars can be obtained for repair and renovation by the end of 2008.

Falls of Clyde is the only surviving iron-hulled, four-masted full rigged ship, and the only surviving sail-driven oil tanker in the world. Mogens Andreasen sailed on her from 2/21/1907 to 3/29/1907.

"She was built in 1878 by <u>Russell and Company</u> in <u>Port Glasgow</u>, <u>Inverclyde</u>, <u>Scotland</u>, launched as the first of eight iron-hulled four-masted ships built for <u>Wright and Breakenridge</u>'s <u>Falls Line</u>. She was named after the <u>Falls of Clyde</u>, a waterfall up the <u>River Clyde</u>. She was built to the highest standard - <u>Lloyd's Register</u> A-1 - for general worldwide trade." Her vitals: "266'1x40'0x21'0; tonnage: 1809 GRT and 1748 NRT. Her forecastle is 34 ft long and the poop 23 ft"

Bit of her interesting history: "After 21 years under the Red Ensign, Falls of Clyde was purchased for US\$25,000. by Captain William Matson of the Matson Navigation Company, taken to Honolulu, Hawaii in 1899, and registered under the Hawaiian flag. When the Republic of Hawaii was annexed by the United States in 1900, it took a special act of the US Congress to secure the foreign-built ship the right to fly the Stars and Stripes."

"From 1899 to 1907, she made over sixty voyages between Hilo, Hawaii, and San Francisco, California. She carried general merchandise from SF and sugar from Hawaii, and passengers both ways. She developed a reputation as a hand, fast and commodious vessel."

At the first Seamanship class session John Pinkerman raised an interesting point. You can tell the amount of charge on a wet cell 12 volt battery by measuring the voltage between the terminals when the battery is disconnected from all loads using the following table.

12 Volt Battery Voltage	Battery Percent of Full Charge
Greater than 12.6 volts D.C.	100%
12.4-12.6	75-100%
12.2-12.4	50-75%
12.0-12.2	25-50%

This should give added reason to have a D.C. volt meter on your console or distribution panel.

The Squadron Has Some New Equipment Lt/C Peter Pranis Jr. AP, Educational Officer

Paul Guerin has given the Squadron two canvas sea anchors and a brand new Danforth 3 inch Corsair II High Speed Compass!

Paul says the sea anchors are a necessity on the Great Lakes as safety equipment to help stay off rocky lee shores when sudden violent storms blow up. By using two anchors with different lengths of rope he says it is possible to give your boat a limited amount of steering capability with he anchors alone.

See, there is something to be thankful for down here in the land of barrier islands and mud flats.

Paul got the compass for the boat he planned to get until health problems got in the way. The compass is a real beauty. How should we use it?

Sea Going Rodeo

Yes, the Sea Going Rodeo is getting a second, third, or fourth look based on talk in the Seamanship class. The idea came up during the discussion on low speed maneuvering.

So far, there have been two major problems.

First, where to hold it? The Port Isabel city manager doesn't want if in the fingers turning basin. The Port Isabel/San Benito Port turning basin south of South Point is too deep; 32' to 38' deep. We'd go broke buying even thin rope for the gallon jug buoys.

Second, what to have in a sea going rodeo?

The first problem at least might have a solution. The Laguna Madre Yacht Club holds its Bay Sail Boat Races to the north of Port Isabel/Laguna Heights. There is three to five feet of water there. We've used the same area for flare shoots and anchoring drills. There are no spectator perches, but so what? Who knows, if it takes off the Port Isabel city manager might "feel the heat to see the light."

The second problem of what maneuvers need to be included is a working progress. If you have any ideas at all, no matter how crazy, get in touch with John Pinkerman. His E-mail is brendenke@cs.com. His phone is 956-450-8113.

In thinking over the second point, it seems that there is a third point. Each maneuver and how it's judged needs to be written up in a "booklet". Each section would describe the maneuver, why it is important, and how it's judged. The booklets could contain advertising to pay for them. They should have tons of appeal to merchants seriously selling to boaters/fishermen.

A Brief Report on the U.S.P.S. Annual Meeting Lt/C Peter Pranis Jr. AP, Educational Officer

I attended my first USPS annual meeting along with Chris Rakestraw in Dallas this past March.

It was good news and bad news from my perspective. With one or two exceptions, everyone I met who is associated with national bridge/organization is a solid individual.

While the schedule doesn't say it, members could sit in on the various committee meetings. Frankly, these meetings were the best part of the whole show!

I sat in on "Seamanship", "Environmental", Pete Hames' Leadership, the tail end of the "The Ensign" meeting and with Chris Rakestraw most of the "PR/Marketing" meeting.

At Seamanship, after all business was finished, I raised the issue of our planned "Seagoing Rodeo". No one in the room had ever heard of such a thing. They really didn't have any ideas, but they are very interested in finding out how it works out. If we pull this off, it will be another first for the LRGVPS. I suspect it would quickly spread Squadrons wide.

The "Environmental etc" committee responsible for Cruise Planning and Weather Courses was held in the hotel's bowels. The meeting consisted of the chairman and me. This let us have a very interesting conversation. The high points:

* A new Weather Course will be out in the Fall of 2009. The main reason for a new course is that USA TODAY is not re-printing its' Weather Book. The main changes to the course will be first, the incorporation of more graphics. Some might be lifted from the USA TODAY book. Secondly, there will be more thermodynamics as in the old, old course. This will readily explain how nimbus cumulous clouds rise as gaseous water vapor condenses, releasing heat of condensation that warms the surrounding air so it has a lower density and thus can rise still higher.

It should be worth waiting for the new edition of the course.

* Cruise Planning is being revised as well. I suggested that they leave it pretty much as it is, with the boat handling section left in it. But above all, leave in the check lists!

- * Finally, and the reason I went to the meeting was to suggest that the Squadrons add a course, "Oceanography/Marine Biology/Fishing". The reason is that half of all boaters' primary reason for boating is to fish. I said that the book, "The Fisherman's Ocean" by David A. Ross, Ph.D. and former head of Woods Hole could serve as a start on such a course. Ross's bottom line is that fish want to eat, stay warm or cool, avoid wasted exercise and avoid being eaten in turn. You'll find fish where two or more of these fish needs are being met. We'll have to see what happens here.
- * Pete Hames' Leadership Session was good, as always. There really needs to br a way this material can be repeated to people several times to let it sink in. No not the power point, but maybe a book or tape?
- * I got to the tail end of the "ENSIGN" meeting. The old timers were upset with the new format of very short articles. It seems that this point was taken to heart in more recent issues. Also, the fancy, high gloss covers are there because advertisers want them. It remains to be seen how much advertising we get.
- * Lastly, the Marketing/PR all morning session attended by Chris Rakestraw with my late arrival was a big disappointment. Yes, they have come up with six really neat TV spot ads. The one on overloading a boat is really funny and to the point.

But...the thing that is nuts is that U.S.P.S has little or no idea of the demographic profiles of either members or boaters in general!!! A marketing professor from the University of Dallas gave a talk in which he quoted the demographics a boat manufacturer gave him. The problem is the manufacturer makes 50 foot boats! Most boats in the water are 25 feet or less. According to BOAT/US 71 percent of boat sales are used boat sales. Yet, when I privately asked the professor if he had any info on these segments he admitted didn't. Note: In his defense, he'd only been working with USPS for a couple of weeks.

Now the real kicker is that our PR/Marketing crew just hasn't looked for data. I asked Chris Rakestraw to do a quick Google search for "Demographic profiles of used boat buyers". She came up with 4,500 hits!! Apparently the info is there if someone will look. The same problem regarding the same information seems to reside with the planning committee.

* On other topics, it appears that the USPS financial position has stabilized. Contrary to popular myth, the Education Department is not a break even operation. It has an operating profit margin of about 41 percent. The Ship's Store on the other hand appears to really be a break even operation.

THE BELL AWARD

There is a teaching aid exhibit with awards associated with the annual meeting. Keith Shantz won the award for the best district winner teaching aid a few years ago with the Knot Board.

A good reason to enter a teaching aid is that the Squadron gets brownie points in the Star Squadron Award calculations.

With the brownie points in mind I started out with the idea of submitting three teaching aids. One; a stripped down version of the classroom fix that we use in the boating course. Two; a gradient display made out of shirt cardboards to illustrate both bottom contours as shown on charts and isobar pressure gradients on weather maps. Three; a balloon to illustrate how fluid flowing from a nozzle will generate a static charge which could lead to a spark then to an explosion if the fluid were gasoline. Hence, why fueling nozzles must be grounded to gas tanks to avoid sparks. The idea is to hold an inflated balloon next to a water faucet/nozzle, one without an aerator, for a few minutes while the water is flowing. Then move the balloon next to your arm and watch the hair on your arm stand up or the feeling of the influence of the electric field the static charge has around the balloon has on your arm hair.

This is a quick and simple demonstration. Apparently that is what the powers that be are looking for. Any more KISS ideas we can use?

I procrastinated and fooled around with the first two ideas until I threw up my hands. Not this year. This left the balloon.

As Bill Rutledge observed, what I came up with was a grade or middle school science demonstration. Anyway, I set up the teaching aid display at national. It was a pile of cream colored balloons with a pile of one sheet explanations.

When the time came to pick up my teaching aid I saw a card. We had won Best in Show! For a Balloon!! I have to admit I had seriously toyed with the idea of using a balloon that had "only for use to prevent disease" on it, but didn't want to embarrass our own incoming Chief Commander Creighton Maynard.

Anyway, I was awarded the Bell Award for Best in Show for the teaching aids. It is an honest to

God ship's bell. Lower Rio Grande Valley Power Squadron now has its name on this unusual trophy. The bell weighs 40 to 50 pounds. It has its own traveling box.

Now I've got to figure out how to get it to the next annual meeting!


