Pictures from January Meeting



And from 2022 WVUE via Gray Media Group, Inc: Worried family members reported the boaters missing. Two of the boaters were found first, with hand injuries from fighting off sharks. The third boater was located and hoisted from the water by a Coast Guard Air Station New Orleans Jayhawk aircrew. All three boaters were wearing life jackets.

Hopefully, members walked away with lots of lessons learned.



















SPRING COMMISSIONING CHECKLIST

Before You Launch:	Make sure your engine intake sea strainer is not cracked or bent from ice, free of corrosion, and		
Check the condition of antifouling paint and repaint if necessary.	is clean and properly secured.		
Hose clamps should be inspected and replaced as necessary. Double clamp fuel lines and exhaust hoses with marine-rated stainless hose clamps. Keep seacocks closed when you are away from the boat.	With inboards, check the engine shaft and rudder stuffing boxes for correct adjustment. A stuffing box should leak no more than two drops each minute when the prop shaft is turning.		
 Inspect all hoses for stiffness, rot, leaks and cracking and replace any that are faulty. Make sure they fit snugly. Inspect prop(s) for dings, pitting and distortion. Make sure cotter pins are secure. Grip the prop (on inboard drive systems) and try moving the shaft up and down and side to side – if it's loose and can be wiggled, the cutless bearing may need to be replaced. 	 Inspect and lubricate seacocks. Make sure strainers are clean. Use a garden hose to check for deck leaks at ports and hatches. Renew caulk or gaskets as necessary. Inspect bilge pump and float switch to make sure they're working properly. Check stove and remote LPG tanks for loose fittings and leaking hoses. 		
 Check the rudderstock to ensure it hasn't been bent. Operate the wheel or tiller to ensure the steering works correctly. Inspect the hull for blisters, distortions and stress cracks. 	 Inspect dock and anchor lines for chafe and wear. If equipped, ensure that the stern drain plug is installed. After the boat is launched, be sure to check all thru-hulls for leaks. 		
Engines and Fuel Systems:	Engine Outdrives and Outboards:		
 Inspect fuel lines, including fill and vent hoses, for softness, brittleness or cracking. Check all joints for leaks, and make sure all lines are well supported with noncombustible clips or straps with smooth edges. Inspect fuel tanks, fuel pumps and filters for leaks. 	 Inspect rubber outdrive bellows for cracked, dried and/or deteriorated spots (look especially in the folds) and replace if suspect. Check power steering and power trim oil levels. 		
Ensure portable tanks and lines are completely drained of stale fuel before filling with fresh fuel. Clean or replace fuel filters. Every few years, remove and inspect exhaust manifolds for corrosion (for inboard powered boats.)	Replace anodes that are more than half wasted away. Inspect outer jacket of control cables. Cracks or swelling indicate corrosion and mean that the cable must be replaced.		
Charge battery. Clean and tighten electrical connections, especially both ends of battery cables. Wire-brush battery terminals and fill cells with distilled water (if applicable).	Inspect lower unit oil level, in sterndrives and outboards, top up as necessary.

TOPSIDE TALK

Mind Your Docking Lines

from Compass December 2022





Recently, I looked into my rode locker. Instead of the neat, orderly docking lines I thought I had stowed, I found what looked like an explosion in a spaghetti factory. I don't know what force of nature turns rope into a tangled mess, but I now believe any line left to itself will become foul and knotted beyond human understanding.

Tangled lines can be dangerous. In addition to docking and spring lines, every berth has electrical lines and water hoses. Together, they present a serious hazard. The marina where my boat, *Melodic*, spends the winter has finger slips more akin to rocking horses than walkways—treacherous even at the best of times. The other evening, my sidestepping a minefield of lines and hoses turned into a high-wire act as I tried to avoid losing my balance and falling into the drink. So, for safety's sake, be mindful of the lines attached to your boat.

The bitter ends of docking lines should be neatly formed into a Flemish coil. Aside from presenting a handsome appearance at the dock, this prevents the lines from running wild. Electrical cords should be

plugged in, coiled twice around the dockside outlet, and then strung to the boat, leaving no excess cord on the dock. Long water hoses pose a particular hazard, but now you can buy inexpensive hoses that coil themselves into a tight, manageable circle, leaving a less hazardous footprint on the dock.

Falling Overboard

While we were at the marina, a fellow boater fell in the water while putting the cover on the bow of his boat. I heard him yelling for help, so we ran down the docks to find him. Because of the dock's height, we couldn't pull him out of the water.

We dropped the stern ladder on his boat and pushed the boat away from the dock. This allowed him to maneuver between the dock and the boat. Then we helped get him to the stern swim ladder. Although he had some serious injuries, he lived to talk about it.

How would you get out of the water if no one could hear your cry for help? Do you have something to climb onto, provided you're physically able to do so? We suggest rigging a lightweight ladder so you can get out of the water quickly.

Look around your marina. Is there a life ring you could throw to someone or a lowered swim ladder nearby? If you're working on a project where you can easily lose your balance and fall in, consider wearing an inflatable personal flotation device. We rigged the swim ladder on our sailboat so we can deploy it from the water.

Other Dockside Hazards

Cleats pose another dockside hazard. To save your toes from injury, wear shoes instead of flip-flops on the dock. Dock lines also pose a tripping hazard. Falling onto wooden or concrete docks or into the water can result in nasty injuries such as contusions, abrasions, broken bones and head injuries. As you walk down a dock, pay attention to your surroundings. Glance forward as well as down. I have seen quite a few people run head-on into an anchor or the bow of a boat because they were looking down at the dock. –Beth Schwab

May you have the hindsight to know where you've been, the foresight to know where you're going and the insight to know when you're going too far.




