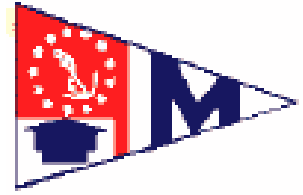

From the P/C

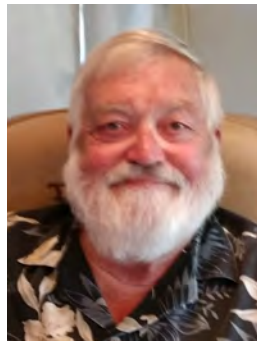

LAKE ERIE ALGAL BLOOMS



Almost all of us have experienced the algal blooms in late summer on Lake Erie. Looking forward to the upcoming year, I have found some information and forecasts that have been given by experts from The Ohio State Research Team. They are attempting to explain what is happening and how it may affect you.

The harmful algal blooms that manifest Lake Erie in the summer can be as murky a concept to understand as they look. But it's important to recognize the distinct and sometimes dangerous impact these blooms can have beyond the Great Lakes' banks: Harmful algal blooms are capable of producing toxins that can cause skin rashes, GI problems and varying degrees of damage to a person's liver, kidneys and the nervous system. Perhaps the most infamous instance of the excessive growth of microscopic algae organisms, commonly known as blooms, resulted in a three-day shutdown of the city of Toledo's water supply. Experts point out that there are six things that we should be aware of when discussing this topic.

* Harmful algal blooms are caused by increases of phosphorus in the lake.

While septic tanks, lawns, golf courses and wastewater treatment plants also contribute to the runoff that ends up in Lake Erie, about 85% comes from agriculture. Heavy spring rains lead to greater runoff of phosphorus from farm fields. The Maumee River runs through extensively farmed agriculture land as it winds through eastern Indiana and western Ohio and then feeds Lake Erie near Toledo. The goal going forward is to reduce nutrient inputs under heavy spring rain conditions and other movement of water over the landscape.

* Blooms are running big.

Bloom events are likely to be at their greatest in August and September and are usually finished by mid-October. Where the bloom settles or moves from day to day is determined by wind conditions (direction and speed). Additionally, if the surface water is calm, the bloom may collect at the surface. Communities from Sandusky and westward are at highest risk because of the shallow water in that part of the lake and the fact that the primary origin of the bloom is Maumee Bay.

* Human and animal health are threatened.

Harmful algal blooms are a known liver toxin and can negatively affect the nervous system. Skin irritations are also a concern. County health departments post advisories regarding when it is unsafe to be in or on the lake or to eat non-commercially caught fish from the lake. The same concern exists for pets.

* Blooms are costly.

It doesn't take an economist to know that slime of any color keeps people away from the lake. The Ohio State researchers estimated blooms to two Ohio lakes cost homeowners \$152 million in lost property value over six years. It is also estimated that harmful algae blooms in Lake Erie in 2014 resulted in \$43 million in lost tourism and recreation dollars. Communities along the lake are spending millions for water treatment as well.

* Scientists are tracking blooms and working with agriculture experts to address causes.

The key is to reduce the amount of phosphorus and nitrogen that gets into the lake. Both play a role in this excess growth, but nitrogen fuels how toxic the bloom might get.

* How close are we to the goal of 40% reduction?

This is not easy to assess. Many of the practices that need to be deployed on the landscape require funding and time. Some practices have a lag effect, meaning they do not draw down nutrients overnight. There has been grant money utilized and efforts by political representatives along with substantial university studies with the goal of assisting in the reduction of this problem. If all of this is successful, we should see and experience the results in the future on our precious Lake Erie.

Even though her father, after his experience in the Navy during WWII, couldn't imagine anyone wanting to spend time on a boat, Shirly learned to sail in the Girl Scout Mariner Program in high school. She also earned her lifesaving (water safety) skills certification in high school and has taught many generations of children how to swim (photo 1951 Mansfield News Journal). She crewed for race teams at the Mohican Sailing Club and volunteered for at least one MPS small craft water safety



program in 1951.

In the early 1960's Shirley and her husband, Ned, bought a 16-foot

runabout which they used on Pleasant Hill Reservoir as well as boat-camped for years with all five children traveling to Gun Lake in Michigan and the Severn River in Canada (1964). On the Severn River trip, they were one of the first boats to traverse a brand-new lock and Shirley finally caught a fish, so excited since she rarely caught a fish. She was showing off her fish when the campground owner broke the bad news – the Sucker she caught was not good for eating.



Soon, the family “needed” a bigger boat and they graduated to a 26-foot Steel Clipper they christened “ELF”. They motored around the western basin of Lake Erie. She thought, with the bigger boat and the kids – or was it the fact they went aground and bent the rudder and had to be towed in on one of the first trips or being caught in storm-tossed chop and there was MUCH excitement involving seasickness – that they needed to learn more about boating and boating safety. Her husband joined the Power Squadron in the mid 1960s, and that is when she

started to get involved in the MPS as a MansMate. During this time, they attended most of the rendezvous that were so popular with the MPS families. Weekends and vacations were always on Lake Erie, fishing, scuba diving, and playing at the north cove of Kelly's Island, and meeting up with friends – Shell's, Robinson's, and many others.

As the kids started graduating from high school and everyone was too busy to spend the weekend on the lake, her husband ventured to Tennessee with fellow squadron member Roy Triska to pick up a new 16-foot runabout. The guys both told their wives the boat belonged to the other one! While without a "big" boat, Shirley and Ned crewed on Other People's Boats (OPB). They sailed with Ted Fort on his Chris-Craft sailboat and Raf and Linda Belliard on their sailboat. Raf and Shirley both get seasick, and they tested various remedies for that affliction – for Shirley, sleep and navigation duties seem to work best!



In 1991, after all the kids had flown the nest and were on their way in careers and life, Shirley and Ned bought the 30-foot Catalina sailboat they christened "Swallow's Nest" after the nesting swallows they found in the air intake pipe!

They shared their love of sailing and Power Squadron by sharing their boat with lots of MPS members over the years.

As Ned got more involved in the Mansfield Power Squadron, so did Shirley. She firmly believes in education. Her kids remember that HUGE celestial navigation tome on the kitchen table, while she studied charts, which were even cooler (to HER) than maps, and that Ned was both proud and a little surprised at how quickly she figured out all the navigation stuff. She was the first woman to earn the rank of Navigator in MPS. Being a certified teacher herself, she taught whenever needed, from the squadron's ABC class for beginner boaters





through the advanced grades. She has been recognized with many awards including, prestigious Perry Millikin Award for being an educational leader. She was honored by the District 7 members for her many teaching aid tools that could be used in classroom situations such as the one shown to the left. As SEO, she did all that she could to promote class locations, student recruitment and teacher certifications.

One story from the Navigator's Club that all the kids remember: She and a select few other wives made spiked punch that made everyone pee blue. There was one unadulterated version, "Angel's Innocence," for someone who was pregnant, but the rest were the same with different names and decanters. The funny thing was that people had their favorite, and the kids thought their teetotaling mom might have gotten the tiniest bit tipsy during the making/testing phase of the adventure. The

other fun thing is that no one mentioned peeing blue. The next newsletter said something about blue corn in the farmer's field next door! That was easy to slip into the *Yachtsman* since it was printed on the printing press in her basement!

Shirley likes to practice her skills. On one sail with Ned, Bear, Bonnie and Broomie as crew, one of the cushions that is part of a bunk got knocked overboard. Shirley executed a Man Overboard Drill to rescue the cushion. They found it because (in addition to her navigation skills) a gull was standing on it – thus the cushion is known as Gull Island.

While crewing on Ted Fort's sailboat, they got into a severe squall and were bare pole motoring when a sudden gust knocked them down. As they self-righted, the lines went overboard and when Ted started the motor again, the lines caught the prop and broke the motor mounts. A very scary situation – all survived! But this story is retold every time the weather gets bad so that her crew understands why a spirited heeling to take advantage of the wind is TOO MUCH!

Jack and Clark Dorr were crewing with Shirley on the Swallows Nest headed up the Detroit River. Clark asked which side of the island they should take, Shirley said they could go on the narrow channel to avoid freighter traffic, IF they followed the buoys marking the channel. Clark missed that "IF" part and ran aground. It took 45 minutes of Shirley teaching Clark and Jack how to get out of the mud before they continued the journey.

On another adventure to the Detroit River, Shirley was below getting dinner ready and told Clark and Jack to keep an eye out for freighter traffic. When Shirley looked out the

companionway, she saw an ENORMOUS freighter bearing down on them and sounding a warning horn. Clark made an evasive maneuver to avoid a catastrophe. How did someone have the presence of mind to take a photo?



The official squadron records show she has been a member for only 32 years, but she had been working in the background and supporting everyone for over 25 years before she became a member. When the squadron allowed

women as members in 1982, she became one of the first, along with Margaret Cole, Ruth Etzwiler, Suzy Niebel, Mary Ann McNaull, to officially join. During these fifty-plus years, she supported the squadron through a wide range of activities. Shirley could always be seen in the background in the kitchen or cleaning clams or making a unique quilt for a



raffle or special district commander gift. So often, it seems that she is in the background, organizing, teaching, figuring out how to get things done, making sure they GOT done, while shying away from the camera. Shirley Fort's generosity with labor and knowledge have enabled so many to enjoy boating over the years.
