# Last Month's Members' Meeting

## "The Connecticut River from the Air"


The January meeting was a rousing success, with 33 people attending.

If you weren't one of them, you missed a great meeting. Our accomplished speaker Jerry Roberts took us on a 410-mile aerial tour of the Connecticut River that began in Old Saybrook and ended at the Canadian border in Vermont. Along the way, we saw amazing sights that can only be seen from the air and were entertained with little known facts and interesting stories. One example was a photo of the wreck of the "Granite State Steamboat," which can be clearly seen from the air. Its 300-foot hull is nestled against the old railroad causeway and looks like a giant leviathan that left the watery depths of the Atlantic Ocean to come to its final resting place on the Saybrook Sandbar. Although plainly visible from the air, the murky waters which surround it all but make it invisible to boaters, except at low tide when parts of it break free of its watery grave to make its existence know. Another story referenced the Saybrook Sandbar and the famous Albert Einstein, who loved to sail, but even after 50 years of doing it, was not very accomplished. He often ran aground and did so while sailing at the mouth of the Connecticut River. It was said, "he discovered relativity once but discovered the Saybrook Sandbar over and over." These examples were from the very beginning of our trip, and the evening was filled with many more such stories.



Our raffle winner for the evening was our own Dan Aldrich, but as can be seen in the picture, it was Diane who took home the \$50 prize.

We also awarded the 1<sup>st</sup> prize for the 2019 Summer Photo Contest. The prize was a canvas print of the winning entry "Nantucket Pond," and was given to Brooke Martin. Brooke spoke briefly about her inspiration for the photograph and her love of the area in which it was taken.

#### Spring 2020 ABC3 Public Boating Courses



##### **Farmington: Thursday, February 27, 2020, at 6:30 p.m.**

Irving Robbins Middle School, 20 Wolf Pit Rd, Farmington CT.

*Sponsored by Farmington Continuing Education.* Pre-registration is required. Call (860) 404-0290.

This is an eight-week course that consists of eight two-hour classes that fulfill the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP), requirements for a Certificate of Personal Watercraft Operation with Personal Watercraft, Safe Waterskiing, and Coastal Boater Endorsements. Additionally, it includes a Piloting section that goes beyond the basics of boat handling and safety. Additional material covers the fundamentals of reading nautical charts, using a chart to plot and follow a safe course, and the basics of using a Global Positioning System (GPS) for navigation.

The cost is \$69 and includes the manual and plotting tools. There is also an additional fee from the Farmington Continuing Education Department.



##### **Bristol: ABC Basic Boating Course. Bristol Library.** These are one day courses.

Bristol Public Library, 5 High St, Bristol, CT.

*Sponsored by the Bristol Library.* Pre-registration is required. Call (860) 655-4623.

This is an 8-hour course that fulfills the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP), requirements for a Certificate of Personal Watercraft Operation with Personal Watercraft, Safe Waterskiing, and Coastal Boater Endorsements.

The cost is \$50, which includes the full manual, morning coffee, and lunch. Course dates are:

- Saturday, March 21, 2020, at 8:30 a.m.
- Saturday, April 18, 2020, at 8:30 a.m.

## HPS Fall Education Results

## Merit Marks

Only one merit mark can be given to a person per year. Members achieving “Senior Member” (5 merit marks) are entitled to receive one free class of their choice. 
### Event Details

## February 25<sup>th</sup> Members' Meeting Will Feature

### *"The Water World of Amsterdam"*

Lt/C Cliff McKibbin, SN, will present slides from his trip last summer to Amsterdam, Netherlands. He will cover the extensive canals of Amsterdam with over 3000 houseboats; the Houseboat Museum showing the inside of a houseboat as well as its cost to buy and moor and its construction; a side trip to the famous Keukenhof Gardens (think 10 million tulips); and a side trip to Enkhuisen to the Zuiderzee Museum. The latter was a waterside village similar to Sturbridge Village with people explaining how to make rope, operate windmills, plus all the activities necessary for a self-sustaining village in the 1800s.

He will also cover the engineering marvel of the walling off the Zuiderzee, turning a third of Holland from a dangerous shallow saltwater pond into a freshwater lake. Finally, he will touch on a few practicalities of a trip to Holland (getting there, food is similar to ours, they speak English, Airbnb, etc.). You'll want to go and see it for yourself!

Cliff is currently the Treasurer and Historian of the Hartford Power Squadron and has served as its Secretary and Commander. He has also served the District 1 organization as Secretary, Treasurer, and is currently the Editor of the Sounds of 1. He and his wife, Lucille, have traveled to Europe several times and always enjoy delving into the different cultures, art, and history.
