Before heading out for a day on the water, be sure to brief your crew. Talk to your passengers about your boat and make sure you have someone on board who knows how to operate it should



you become incapacitated. A crew briefing can make running your boat easier and your guests feel safer.

Here are some things you should consider

covering: - Where to find life jackets, a first-aid kit, visual distress signals and fire extinguishers. Be sure to offer life jackets to your guests and encourage everyone to wear them. Additionally, point out the best places to sit on board and remind them to spread out and not all sit or stand on one side of the boat.

How to operate the VHF marine radio in case of an emergency. Most people know that radios are "push to talk," but in an emergency, they forget to "release to listen."

How you will handle docking procedures and what help you expect when you get to your destination. You don't want to be unprepared for docking. Although everyone wants to help, they may not know the best way to do so. Covering this ahead of time helps avoid last-minute confusion and mishaps.

While you're at it, discuss the route so they understand what they will see along the way. Visitors may not be familiar with local waters. Helping them appreciate what they are about to experience sets the stage for a fun day.

Finally, always have someone on board who can be your partner in command. This person should be able to operate your boat and get everyone home safely (or to a designated access point where help is available) if you

become incapacitated. Taking time to brief your crew will help everyone stay safe and have more fun on the water.

Modern Marine Navigation



A powerful navigation tool that fits in your pocket, the smartphone has changed the way all boat operators approach marine navigation. Our options used to be a paper chart or cruising area charts—plus a compass, timer, speed indicator and a charted object or two plotted



bearings to find where we were on the chart. Now, you can determine latitude and longitude in seconds using any smartphone. Paired with a charting app like OpenCPN, Aqua Map, iNavX, Argo and i-Boating, your smartphone can

instantly display your location and all navigational data. **How it works**

Most every smartphone, as well as tablets and laptop computers, have full GPS receivers as well as the radios—receivers and transmitters—for the cellular and Wi-Fi network areas we live in. Most phones also have other sensors and radios. As a result, many new recreational boaters use phones or tablets instead of the pricey chartplotters found on larger recreational vessels. Many boaters with chartplotters will also mount a tablet with a charting app to get different views of the chart while underway.

Newer or updated navigation equipment is also moving to a new NMEA 2000 networking standard, https://kus-usa.com/resources/a-quick-guideto-nmea-2000/ so all instruments on your boat will communicate over Wi-Fi, including the chartplotter and any phone or tablet logged into the network. This means your chart apps and programs can grab data and display navigation information that the chartplotter has (AIS, engine data, radar, anemometer, speed meter). Other functions like remote auto helm control accompany this capability.

Mounting your tools

Mounting smartphones and tablets on a boat is easy. Sailboats with a binnacle have a large variety of rail mounts to choose from. To find one, search for "rail mounts for cellphones and tablets" to find a variety to choose from. On boats with a flat surface, many people Velcro-mount their devices to the bulkhead. When mounting phones and tablets, choose a location that makes viewing them easy while you are underway.

OpenCPN https://opencpn.org/

A free open-source app, OpenCPN shows how the new screen environment of chartplotters and GPS-enabled applications work along with building an understanding of charts. OpenCPN demonstrates waypoints and waypoint navigation for trip planning.

Because OpenCPN is free, it runs on Windows, Macintosh OS, Android, and Linux systems. It does not run on iPhone or iPad. All charting apps operate similiarly, so knowing one gives you the skill needed to adapt to other GPS charting apps.

Safety - Does Your PLB or EPIRB Need Offseason Maintenance?

While today's personal locator beacons and emergency position indicating radio beacons are essentially maintenance-free, the battery requires periodic servicing. Each device has a sticker showing the battery expiration date.

The newest EPIRBs have 10-year lithium batteries that you can often replace yourself. Older EPIRBS and PLBs have 5-year batteries and usually need professional service to ensure the devices remain waterproof and transmit properly. IMPORTANT: You can't put a 10-year battery in a 5-year EPIRB.

If you send it in for service, the turnaround time varies, but you should expect a couple of weeks at minimum, and probably longer during the offseason when everyone else is sending theirs in for service. Check your owner's manual for additional information. Once you get it back, don't forget to test it before putting it back on board.
