#### **Marine Navigation Course Out in Beta Form**

For several years we've been hearing that the new Marine Navigation course is almost ready. Well, "almost" is here. The beta test version was released at the end of January. It is in e-book format only, both for student kit and instructor guide. Feedback from the instructors will be used to make corrections and changes before the final version is released sometime later this year.

The new course will be a replacement for the current Piloting course. It has a strong emphasis on electronic charting and uses Open CPN. It also includes tutorials to help the instructor with the software. It continues support of paper charting and it covers both inland and coastal navigation. It has 7 sections and is expected to be taught in 9 class sessions plus the exam.

Open CPN is free, computer navigation software that anyone can download and use. Chapter 5, Section 18 in the ABC3 book has an introduction to it. The basic course, as we normally teach it, only includes chapters 1-4.

#### Wonder How a Course or Seminar is Developed?

I've always wondered what the process was to develop one of our courses. I knew there were a lot of people involved but I didn't understand what it took to bring about a new or updated educational offering. R/C Priscilla Clarke, AP chair of the Publishing Committee gives a good overview of the process in a 15-minute video. The process begins when the committee responsible for the content has the idea and continues until the final product is ready for your SEO to order. #### **Boat Operator Certification Certifiers**

District 15 currently has 14 BOC certifiers. A certifier is one who can sign off on the on-the-water portion of the BOC program at a specific level; Inland Navigator (IN), Coastal Navigator (CN), Advanced Coastal Navigator (ACN) or Ocean Navigator (ON). Since the pandemic, all of our certifiers have had their certifier expiration date extended to 3/21/2026, regardless of whether or not that certifier completed any certifications in the past four years. While the certifier extension was implemented for all our certification, which is required every four years and is necessary for BOC certifiers as well as those teaching the public boating (ABC3) course. Certifiers at the





CN level and above are also required to maintain First Aid and CPR certification which must be renewed every two years. Certifiers can also teach the Hands-On training formerly

known as Practical On-The-Water Training.

#### Florida Honors Dick Carson

Our own D/1st/Lt Dick Carson, JN-IN was recently recognized by the Boating and Waterways Section of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission as Florida's 2021 Boating Educator of the Year! He was instrumental in getting virtual education for America's Boating Course available in Florida as well as setting up a system to facilitate issuing state cards to those

completing the course. In part the reward article reads: "Without Dick's work, students who wanted to take a classroom boating safety class during the pandemic may not have had the opportunity." Interestingly, Dick actually lives in Alabama, near the border with Florida. In addition to contributing to educating the public in two states, Dick serves on our



national Basic Public Education Committee and has chaired that body. He also serves on the national Boat Operators Certification (BOC) Committee, is an Assistant Regional Director for BOC, is the SEO and Vessel Safety Check Chair for his squadron and the Asst DEO for his District. Volunteers like Dick are the life blood of our organization. His work has made the waters safer not only in Alabama and Florida but everywhere we reach. Congratulations Dick!

#### **DB2000** and the Information Center

The phase-out of DB2000 continues. Most upload functions have now been disabled. You will no longer be able to transmit member information changes, OD-1 and OD-2 reports, merit marks, and other uploaded information from DB2000. If you attempt to use DB2000 for reports that have been disabled, you will get an "Upload Failed" message. The Historian Report remains an active function of DB2000.

Please note that access to some of the Information Center functions is limited to certain job classifications.

The Information Center is replacing most DB2000 functions, but the Information Center has even more features that are useful to squadron and district officers and members. A great place to start is with the online Information Center training. 

As a boater, you may be eager to get underway, but you need to consider sun protection when you're on the water. The sun can have an unwanted impact on you, from sunburn to boater's fatigue.

Warm, sunny weekends bring out more boat traffic. If you've taken a

boating class, you may think you're a safe boater. But what about the other guy—does he know the rules of the road?

Even if you boat defensively, you may not be as sharp as the day wears on, especially if you become tired and dehydrated.

#### How to protect yourself

- Put up the bimini if you have one. Run the boat from under its shade. You'll be cooler, and it will be easier to see your surroundings. UV rays reflect off the water and your boat's surface, however, so...
- Wear a high-SPF sunscreen, especially if you have fair skin.
- Wear a hat if you don't have a bimini. The brim will shade your eyes, and you'll feel cooler.
- Wear good polarizing sunglasses. They will block much of the sun's UV rays, and you'll see much better.
- Drink, drink, drink—but not beer or other alcohol, which accelerates dehydration. Water is best, but juices and other fluids are also good. If you and your crew aren't perspiring or using the head on a hot, sunny day, chances are you're dehydrated, which can lead to heatstroke.
- Anchor or pull in someplace when you're tired. Rest will help refresh you.

Remember, there's no substitute for common sense. Take steps to stay sharp when you're on the water.

A common phenomenon, **boater's fatigue** occurs when you're out enjoying a day on the water. Caused by environmental stressors, boater's fatigue can impair both your physical and mental performance.

In addition to burning unprotected skin, sunlight bouncing off the water affects your vision, compromising color perception, peripheral vision and depth perception. It also contributes to dehydration.

Engine noise and vibration provide additional environmental stressors, as does the boat's constant motion.

# Get Ready for Hurricane Season

Ready or not, hurricane season officially starts June 1. Experts encourage residents of hurricane prone areas to start preparing now.



If you boat is in hurricane-affected areas, follow these recommendations when securing your boat for a storm:

- Remove trailer boats from the water. Take them home or to an area elevated above the anticipated storm surge. Consider storing trailer boats in a garage.
- Choose a location free of trees, overhead wires and other potential dangers when storing boats on land. Avoid areas prone to ground saturation, because shifting ground can topple boats.
- Strap boats to the ground when possible.
- Reduce a boat's surface area—whether it's stored on water or land. Remove all covers, dodgers, canvas, biminis and gear stored on deck, including dinghies, small outboard motors, spare sails, and fuel containers. Remove all sails from the rigging.
- Consider removing expensive electronics and storing them at home.
- Close all through-hull valves (except auto bilge drains or other deck drains).
- Ensure that all batteries are fully charged. Turn off all electronics except for automatic bilge pumps.
- Close and secure all ports, windows and hatches as well as all vents and dorade boxes to engine spaces.
- Add extra dock lines. Use as many cleats as
  possible to distribute the forces on these lines to
  a larger area. Secure some heavy lines to pilings,
  allowing for tide and storm surge.
- Keep lines from the boat to floating piers as tight as possible. Tighten again after the lines are wet. The shock load of lines pulling on cleats is what usually causes their failure.
- Add chafing gear on dock and mooring lines where needed, especially if the lines go through chocks. The heavy strain placed on these lines significantly increases the amount of wear on them.
- Put out all your fenders, even if your boat is in a slip with no other boats beside you.
- Check your insurance policy, and keep it in a safe place.
