EDUCATION OFFICER

1. We received the grades for the piloting course. Four of the five students passed.
2. Engine Maintenance has started after a one week postponement due to snow. Enrollment may rise as high as 25 students. Everyone connected with the Education Department was surprised and gratified with this enrollment.
3. Work continues on creating a two year schedule for courses and seminars. I expect that this work will be completed before the February dinner meeting. I expect to share the schedule with you at that time.
4. At last check, enrollment for the weather class was 5 students. I expect more people will enroll before the course begins. I would not be surprised if the class fills at 15 students.
5. Bill Smethells is busy planning for the Marine Electrical Systems class. Part of that planning process is researching and acquiring lab materials for the course. In making those acquisitions, we are taking a long term approach and thinking that the course will be offered more than occasionally.
6. The success of the Engine Maintenance course makes me begin to think seriously that we have solved the enrollment problem for our classes by offering them through NMC's Extended Educational Services division. What happens with the Weather and Marine Electrical Systems classes will tell us a lot more.
7. While USPS rules require that we teach the ABC course once a year, my approach is to offer the Michigan DNR course as a primary beginners course because it is a shorter class that makes it easier for younger people to be certified to use water craft. Last year we had under 10 people all together in two sections of the ABC3 class and about 15 in one offering of the Michigan DNR course. I think offering the Michigan DNR course will give us a bigger exposure to the public. We are also exploring offering this course through NMC. This may not be a negative because people connect price and value in ways that make sense but may not be rational.

Have You Visited Your Boat Lately?

Visiting your boat now gets you out of the house and could save you a lot of headaches next spring. If you are like most boat owners, out-of-sight usually equates to out-of-mind. Whether your boat is stored indoors or out, it's always a good idea to visit it several times per winter if at all possible. Do a walk-around and look for anything that has changed since you last visited, looking especially for shifting of the boat due to flat trailer tire, loose jack stand or sinking of a corner of the cradle. While not a big deal if the boat is indoors, a boat that is not level may not drain or shed water properly when outdoors and could result in water or ice damage inside, as well as mold and mildew growth. Give the cover or tarp a close look as well. Look for tears or looseness that could allow water or snow to get inside, and also make sure that air vents are not blocked. The idea is to let air in and keep moisture out!

If you can get aboard, be sure to do it. When you first get under the cover or go inside the cabin, use your nose. Be sensitive to odors that are not normal for your boat such as gas fumes, propane, mouse urine or mold. If you have a battery charger operating during the winter, the smell of hot plastic or a sulfur-like odor would likely be caused by a poor electrical connection or a battery that is "cooking" due to internal failure or an out of control charger. If cockpit drains are open to the elements, be sure they are clear and have not been choked with leaves. It's surprising just how far from trees your boat can be and still end up with leaves on board.

Go below and don't forget your flashlight. Look around for anything abnormal such as new water stains or wetness, especially near hatches, ports and deck hardware attachment points. If you have a sailboat and are storing with the mast up, look for signs of leakage at the chainplates and mast. Check above-decks drain hoses that pass inside to be sure they haven't ruptured due to ice inside. Lastly, check that storage locker doors and sole access covers are open to ensure good ventilation. Don't forget the chain locker door if your boat has one.

Finding small problems now can prevent large problems in the spring and, perhaps, might avoid a delay in your boating season due to unexpected issues. If nothing else, a mid-winter visit will get you thinking about things your boat needs for the coming summer and things you can do to get yourself ready as well, such as taking a Power Squadron course!
