Our June dinner will be on June 4 and will feature a presentation on the Antrim Water Trail. This will also be kids night, with Ice Cream sundaes for desert.

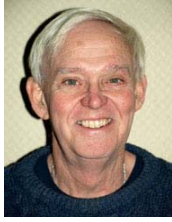

EDUCATIONAL OFFICER

1. The Sail course has begun. We have 16 students. At this point we are learning about the science that lies behind sailing - stability, balance and how the wind makes sailing possible. Next week my boat goes in the water and after the students tune the boat, we will embark on a month of sailing parallel to the classroom activities. By then it will be June and time for the exam and the celebration that follows it.

2. Next weekend, we will begin the second ABC class. We hope to have a larger group than we had in the first session of the class in March. The class will be held at the Grand Traverse Mall. In June, we will also be offering an ABC class in Elk Rapids for members of the Elk Rapids Yacht Club and the local community. This is new territory for us and it may be a new source for squadron members.

3. Since we have expanded the number of news outlets we notify of our events we have been getting good numbers for our seminars and courses. Numbers are running in the 14-15 range. This week I am going to add The Cadillac News to the newspapers we send press releases to. In addition, I need to contact the radio stations to find out how to best contact them. Sending press releases to their station .com addresses has not been successful.

4. On April 25th I represented the squadron at a joint gathering of the Grand Traverse Yacht Club and the Maritime Heritage Alliance. The event was open to the public and at least 6 members of the squadron attended the event. I was asked to give a brief introduction to the squadron. In that introduction, I shared our mission of boating safety and education as well as social interaction. I told them about our courses, especially the ABC classes, and invited them to visit our website to learn more about who we are and what we do. There was a two part program featuring the summer ventures of the Madaline in the Great Lakes and the one summer - a trip around the Black Sea - of the 10 voyage of Doug Roberts and Sarah Boys to the Mediterranean. The food was good - pulled pork, some very good baked beans and yummy cold slaw - sort of an early summer picnic.

5. Our work creating a partnership with NMC's Extended Education Service is making progress. It seems that we can market our courses through EES at a price that the public will find acceptable. If that turns out to be the case, we will solve the problem of getting acceptable room space at a price we can afford.

6. Because of illness, I was not able to attend the SEO meeting at the District 9 conference at Shanty Creek this weekend, I will have to catch up with the news from the Education Department and share that with you in the next 45th in June. I am beginning to feel more normal.



Safety Officer's Report

Alcohol and Boating: New Michigan Legislation

Boating on the lakes of Michigan is one of the best parts of living here. There is nothing like taking your boat out on a beautiful Michigan day. Generally, Michigan boaters are very safe and

Observe the “rules of the road”. Each year, Michigan Boating Industries Association (MBIA) publicizes the impressive safety record Michigan boaters have in the 3rd largest boating state in the country. "Boating in Michigan is a very safe recreational activity," states Nicki Polan, Executive Director. "In fact, Michigan's safety record is among the best in the country." While this is good news, we must recognize that approximately one-third of boating accidents are caused by boaters who are under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. For this reason, Michigan has enacted new rules for boats and other recreational vehicles. Before you head out onto the water, make sure that you know what the changes are. The new changes include: The blood alcohol limit has changed. It was .10 and now it is .08, just like if you were driving a car.

If you are under the age of 21, you may not operate a boat with any alcohol in your system. Michigan law does not prohibit drinking on the water. Passengers—and the watercraft operator—can openly cruise around with a bottle or two. But that’s where the leniency stops. Just as operating a motor vehicle under the influence is illegal, so is jumping behind the wheel of a boat. According to Frank Jennings Jr., the U.S. Coast Guard's recreational boating and water safety program manager for the Great Lakes, a breathalyzer test proving that limit is not necessarily needed to take a person into custody. Coast Guard officials will conduct field sobriety tests and may also take into consideration whether the boater appears to be disoriented, confused or smells of alcohol. “Even a couple of beers, once you combine that with the sun beating down and the wind on your face, is going to increase the effects of alcohol on the operator,” he said. Coast Guard officials often will stop a boat for safety and equipment checks if the driver is seen drinking, said Dan Kehrein, a boatswain's mate 2nd Class with the Grand Haven station. (An interesting aside here is that in 2012, the Governor also signed into law Public Act 162, which states that, if a boater has a Coast Guard Safety Check decal on his or her boat, they cannot be pulled over for a random safety inspection, unless there is probable cause for violation.) Rep. Dave Pagel, one of the sponsors of the alcohol limits legislation, said “I think it sends a message that these are family activities and people should practice them safely”.
