From a squadron perspective, we also are transitioning from our winter dinners, classes and programs to our own unique summer programs. We will take a three-month hiatus from our general dinner meetings, executive committee meetings, Lunch with the Commander and most of our instructional classes. Our team responsible for Vessel Safety Checks (VSCs) is kicking into high gear, and our new summer sailing class will have students for the first time.

The squadron's summer fun programs kick off June 16th with the Shakedown Cruise, which once again will be graciously hosted by Paul and Nancy Gonzales. I am pleased to report that registrations for the Seminar Series has picked up substantially. We now have 16 people registered for 50 seminar seats. This falls short of 2021 when we had about 50% more registrations, but this is a definite improvement over a month ago. On June 5th at 7 PM he will be discussing Smartphone Navigation and on June 7th at 7 PM, the topic will be Anchoring in Northern Michigan. TRENT SEVERN WATERWAY SETTING UP AN EDUCATIONAL CRUISE FOR KIDS

Presentation by Jim & Lisa Favors

Last summer, Jim and Lisa Favors planned and executed a boat trip to Canada's Trent Severn Waterway (TSW) with their two oldest grandchildren. They designed the cruise to be educational, picking a waterway they are familiar with, one with historical content and some fun boating features. The kids would learn about early commerce transportation in Canada and the significance of traveling through a historic lock system. Each lock has its own story to tell.

The full length of the TSW stretches 239 miles from Trent to Port Severn, Ontario, connecting Lake Ontario to Georgian Bay. There are 44 locks on the entire waterway which cater to recreational boaters, providing overnight moorage along lock walls, which may include washrooms, campaites, and potable water. Parks Canada also has a fun Xplorer's program for children.

In this presentation, the Favors will share how they planned their 111-mile, 12day boat trip, from Peterborough to Orillia, Ontario (transiting 19 of the 44 total locks). Unlike most of their adult explorations, Jim and Lisa focused this trip around their grandkids' needs.

The kids would learn about all aspects of adventure cruising, not only trip planning, navigation, and reading charts, but walking while exploring historic little towns along the waterway. Periodically, the Favors would communicate important boating lessons on how to stay safe onboard and around open water, traveling in a foreign country, and general life onboard, such as stocking the galley, food prep, cooking and cleanup of meals, clothing management, cleaning and maintenance chores, all while conserving limited resources (water and electricity). When cruising for long periods, boaters have to do all the things they do at home to maintain their health and welfare.

The Favors will share details on how they planned for the trip, how it worked for the kids and what they would, and wouldn't, do next time.

Let Someone Know Before You Go Rescue is faster when you use the USCG Float Plan

Whether you are a power boater or kayaker, the USCG Float Plan works for you. Set up a basic plan ahead of time and save it on your computer or smart device. Update it when you decide where and when you're going to go. Then, e-mail or text your completed plan to whoever you choose to follow up should you not return or check-in as planned.

The USCG Float Plan is a state-of-the-art lifesaving device that is used by search and rescue personnel to assist in reducing the search area in order to locate you in the shortest amount of time possible. It is also the first and only float plan that guides and directs the holder of your float planned to be accurately remembered and ultimately conveyed in an emergency situation. Without a float plan you are counting on someone else, a friend, neighbor, or family member to remember detailed information that rescue personnel need in order to find you. Information that can make a difference in the outcome

Features and capabilities you'll find in this version of the float plan:

- Save and send using any device with Adobe Acrobat Reader installed.
- Can be used with any size or type of recreational vessel.
- Accommodates up to 13 canoers/kayakers/paddle boarders that want to paddle together as a group.
- User defined fields provide increased flexibility.
- The ability to enter the unique identification numbers for the vessel's EPIRB and Personal Locator Beacons (PLBs) attached to individual PFDs.
- Drop down lists that let you easily see all of your choices.
- Accommodates up to 12 passengers.
- Identify up to 21 waypoints.
- Exclusive Boating Emergency GuideTM assists the person holding your plan with starting the Search And Rescue process.
- 100% digital means it's easy on the environment.

• The float plan and the data you enter is stored on your computer or mobile device under your control.

• It's FREE. From the experts in boating safety, the U.S. Coast Guard and U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary.

Lawrence Award-Joel Lockwood

This year's winner joined USMS in 2012 at the age of 78. Since joining, he has swam for for 4 different teams/workout groups FAST, STRAY CATS, MAC and North Coast Masters out of Traverse City.

Over the year's he has had numerous USMS Top Ten times in all three courses (SCY, SCM,LCM).

He has held the top spot in the 200 Breaststroke 85-89 age group FINA Masters Swimming World Rankings.

In 2020, by attending just two meets, he was able to achieve 11 USMS Top Tens times. In 2021, he had 8 swims in the USMS Top 10.

Then in 2022, he swam in two Michigan meets and achieved 7 swims in the USMS Top Ten and had two #1 swims in the 500 Free and 50 Breast.

He now has a total of 108 USMS Top Ten swims in the 11 years he has been swimming since 2012.

For all of these past achievements and to future endeavors, the 2023 Lawrence Award goes to Joel Lockwood.

This award was initiated in 1978 and is names after Bob Lawrence. The recipient of this award is a Michigan Masters Swimmer who has achieved outstanding performances in National competition over the last year as well as over their long-term swimming career. Examples of National competition include the following: USMS All-American selections, National and World Number One Swims in yearly Top-Ten rankings, USMS National and Fina World Records, USMS National Championship Meet and FINA World Championship Meet Titles, FINA World and USMS National Top-Ten Rankings. Additional examples for consideration include: YMCA National Records or YMC Championship Meet Titles and Michigan Masters State Records or State Championship Meet Titles
