





Last Month's Members' Meeting "A Discussion on Connecticut's Boating Industry"



February's meeting featured Don MacKenzie. In addition to being an owner of a Marina and boat dealership, Don is on the Legislative Committee of the Connecticut Marine Trades Association (CMTA), and it is clear he has a passion for the boating industry. The CMTA has approximately 350 business owning members that represent about 8000 employees. They represent every facet of boating in Connecticut. Among the topics discussed was the recent reduction in Connecticut's sales tax on boats to 2.99% which the organization worked on for almost three years to bring about. The tax decrease has reversed the trend of declining sales in Connecticut's boating industry by allowing the state to be competitive with Rhode Island which has no tax on boats. Instead of losing money on the tax cut, revenues the state obtains from the boating industry have increased. Unit sales are up 31%, gross sales are up 56%, 86% of the dealers added employees, 46% of the sales were due to the new tax rate, 95% of the businesses grew, and tax revenue increased 4% over the same period last year. All this at half the rate! Because boating is perceived as a rich person's hobby, and the tax cut is seen by some as one for the rich, our new governor is seeking its repeal. The reality of the situation is that the average boat size in Connecticut is 21 feet, not what comes to mind when you think of a rich person's boat. The governor must be made to see how detrimental his proposal would be to the state and the boating industry.

Don also discussed the need to get the 30-year-old population back into boating. He believes what is needed is a 17' center console boat package, (boat, motor, and trailer) that can be purchased for \$15,995. He believes this type of package would rival the success Boston Whaler had in the late 50's with a similar package based on its 13' Sport. This boat was a mainstay for Boston Whaler for three decades, and it got a significant number of today's boaters started in boating.

Don's last message was the workforce in the boating industry is aging and it is getting harder to bring in new blood. There are a lot of good paying jobs in boating, particularly in engine maintenance. Training is offered and a career with excellent benefits can be made by individuals with a strong work ethic that are not afraid to work. All and all, an enlightening presentation.

Change of Watch Dinner

This year's Change of Watch (COW) dinner is being held at the Manor Inn Restaurant, 1636 Meriden-Waterbury Turnpike, Southington, CT 06489. If you are not familiar with the COW, it is an annual time-honored formal event preserved by a rich heritage of naval tradition. The COW gives squadron members the opportunity to witness the transfer of responsibility of bridge assignments and to give recognition to the accomplishments of both outgoing officers and squadron members. Officers elected at the Annual Members' Meeting held in March are also sworn in.



May Members' Meeting "Ferry Tales"

Windsor's Bissell's Ferry

The May 28th Members' Meeting will feature a talk by Bill Fournier. Bill will present us with the intriguing history of Connecticut River ferries from the earliest 'Fording Place' to their eventual replacement with bridges. Bill's research into the subject included viewing many items housed in local Historical Societies and Libraries, as well as his own extensive collection of Connecticut River historical items, books, Army Corps of Engineers charts and related reports. He is a wealth of knowledge and his presentation will be enlightening.

We will also be given a glimpse into the history of well-used ferry crossings located at Windsor, Hartford, Wethersfield, Haddam, and Old Saybrook.

Having grown up living next to the Connecticut River at the family homestead, Bill obtained his first rowboat at seven years old. He helped his parents maintain and operate Fournier's Boat Livery for the rental of Shad fishing boats. His interest in boating includes service in the CT DEEP Boating Division. Starting in 1983, he coordinated and taught various boating safety education classes throughout the State.

Bill's interests in history continued to grow while researching the history of King's (Terry's) Island. Currently, in preparation for publication, his research will be a reference for historians. The reference should also have a wide appeal to a general audience of those interested in River history. We are honored to have him as a speaker and look forward to his presentation.
