On-Water Communication



So you've used the squadron resources above to plan your boating activity. Now that you're on the water how do you communicate with members around you? If you know who you are meeting on the water, cell phone & text is an easy way to communicate. You can call your friends on VHF. BUT there is a third option, use the *ARGO* app.

ARGO NAV is a boating app that is a functional chart plotter while allowing you to connect with other ARGO using friends through chat. This app shows your ARGO friends position and allows you to plot a course to their location. The developer is working towards Group specific private chats. The basic app with these functions are FREE. If you have questions or want to learn more about this app, contact John Torres who uses it frequently.

Communication is crucial in growing the Squadron and we now have multiple platforms in which to accomplish this. Reach out to other members and invite them to your next adventure or offer a helping hand to new members. It's also OK to ask others if they have plans and would they mind if you joined in. 

Vessel Spotlight

This month's *Vessel Spotlight* is "C-Life", a 1984 Egg Harbor Golden Egg 40 Flush Deck Motor Yacht owned by members Chuck and Michelle Beatty.

The Egg Harbor 40 Motor Yacht was one of the last of the flush-deck motor yacht designs built by a major U.S. manufacturer. Ending production in 1986, she was built on the reworked hull of the earlier Pacemaker 40 MY whose molds and tooling Egg Harbor had acquired after Pacemaker closed down in 1980.

C-Life is 40' in length, has a 14' 1" beam, she is 16' 2" above the water line, without the radar arch. She is built on a modified-V fiberglass hull with a full keel and drafts only 2' 11". She carries 290 gallons of fuel, 75 gallons of water and weighs in at over 30,000 lbs. She has two-staterooms, a U-shaped galley down from the salon, and the aft head is equipped with a separate stall shower. A built-in washer/dryer is hidden under the salon wet bar, and the grain-matched teak woodwork still looks wonderful after 39 years of service.





The aft stateroom is full width and features an island queen bed with a large cedar lined closet. Topside, the covered pilot house features a second wet bar as well as a bench seat for both captain and first mate. Wide side decks provide secure access to the bow with high rails and hand holds. She has twin inboard Crusader 350's installed for power and cruises comfortably and quietly at 7 knots at about 1800 RPM. But in a pinch, she can jump up on plane and skim along at around 15 knots. An Onan generator provides electricity away from the dock and her flybridge is high above the waterline for great views of the Chesapeake and Patuxent River.

Chuck and Michelle purchased "C-Life", June 2, 2023 and are the forth owners of the vessel. They joined the Power Squadron in December 2022 in preparation for owning a yacht but at that time owned two Sea-Doo personal watercraft (and still 'Doo"!)

The name "C-Life" has several different meanings that melted together. First and foremost, the 'C' stands for Christ. The Beatty's are of strong Christian faith and hope to use this wonderful boat as a tool to share the word of God with those who come aboard. It is also an acronym for 'See life from a different perspective' which can either be perceived from a religious point of view, or simply... not from land. And of course, what better way to see life, than out on the water on C-Life watching sea life?

Summer Cruise 2023 with the Valley Forge Squadron - By Lt/C Steve Bizzarro, P

Plans for the 2023 summer cruise began coming together late in 2022. The cruise has become an annual tradition amongst ABC members from both the Valley Forge and Annapolis Squadrons. A college friend and member of the Valley Forge group first invited my wife and I last year and we had a wonderful time meeting new friends and enjoying the time on the water. This year was no different as a total of 8 boats joined us in traveling to several locations on the bay and sharing our love of the water.

We pulled out of Mill Creek and entered the Patuxent River under light winds, late morning on June 2nd. The summer cruise was to begin on Saturday, June 3rd in Annapolis. We wanted to arrive early and planned to anchor in Selby Bay just off the South River for the night to get an early start to the Severn River the next day. Winds were light just about all day, so we ended up motoring most of the way. There is no better way to get an appreciation of the bay than at 5.5 knots! As we entered the South River, we could see the first wave of boats headed down the bay for the Annapolis to Newport race being held that weekend. It was a wonderful site.

We were up with the sun, had a good breakfast...with coffee and then pulled anchor. The crab boats were already out ahead of us, it was so peaceful, nonetheless. The morning winds were again light, so we motored out and around the Thomas Point Lighthouse towards the triple towers that mark the entrance to the Severn. By the time we got to The Yacht Basin in Annapolis, it was late morning and radioed for our slip assignment. We were lucky to get a slip right off Spa Creek with a great view of the drawbridge. It was fun relaxing and getting some boat watching in as all the boats went right on by as if in a parade. We met up with our fellow cruisers for the first of several boat crawls that were planned. It was good seeing many of the same faces and friends I had met during last year's cruise. We got caught up on life and had some laughs. The following day we were on our own to explore and sample some of the great food that Annapolis is known for.



On Monday the 5th we got ready to go and headed out of the Severn down the bay to Herrington Harbor South. As we rounded Thomas Point, we got our first look at several dauphin pods that guided us in our travels. This was the first day that you could really notice the haze in the air from what they said were the fires in Canada. I was



fortunate to just have to follow my breadcrumbs to Herrington as l've been there several times, each was memorable. The marina reserved the entire entrance way dock for us cruisers. It was great for comradery and our next boat crawl on Dark Star, a 47' Catamaran. Several squadron members rented this beautiful boat together. We all got the grand tour and had a wonderful time talking boats. The sad thing was that due to the light winds Dark Star never had a chance to put its sails up during the week, only for the trip home! The following day we enjoyed the resort and had a catered cookout for dinner.

Leaving the marina Wednesday morning the smoke haze had our visibility down to about half a mile...dead reckoning was out of the question. Fortunately, GPS and several location apps kept us on course. Our next stop was Saint Michaels. Traveling across the bay and across the main shipping channel in low

visibility conditions would have been challenging without AIS. AIS gave us a good look at all the shipping traffic in our area and what to steer clear of. Even if you don't have AIS, you can access the information on your smartphone using the "Marine Traffic" app.

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(Members Adventures Cont'd)

As we came into the Eastern Bay the wind began building out of the North, which slowed our progress initially, but gave us a boost once we made the turn up the Miles River. We had reservations at the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum and were one of the first boats to arrive as we were hosting the boat crawl that evening. We had a great spot on the "T" head and settled in for a wonderful stay on the museum grounds. That evening we went to dinner at the Crab Claw, just outside the museum. This is the last year for the iconic restaurant, as it was recently sold to the museum. It will be interesting to see what they do with it. The following day was filled with exploration of the museum



grounds and a boat construction tour, followed by a Commander's Cocktail Party. Friday morning, we headed north towards Prospect Bay and Kent Narrows. We were a bit early for the next opening of the Kent Narrows Bridge, so we just kept circling until our turn. There is a very narrow channel here and you don't want to get outside of the markers. This route saves you from having to go back out to the bay and around Kent Island to head north. From the narrows, we came out of the Chester River on our way to Rock Hall. Rock Hall is another very shallow entrance where you must be watchful. We had slips at Haven Harbor which is a wonderful, protected oasis on the Eastern Shore. Following another boat crawl and a wonderful dinner at the Harbor Shack we retired for a well-deserved sleep after an exhausting day of fun.

Saturday was the last official day of our cruise marked by the Cruise Wrap-Up Cookout right there at the marina. The food and company were fantastic as we each shared our stories of the week and talked of future plans. Sunday morning, we all departed for home. For some that was a quick sail across the bay but for us it was the beginning of another two-day trip south. We got an early start and made great progress working our way down the bay. The weather prediction was for winds building out of the south, 15 steady with gusts to 30. We easily got by the Thomas Point lighthouse weaving around the 11 cargo ships we counted anchored just south of the bridge. As we got to Selby Bay the conditions weren't that bad, so we decided to press on knowing that the forecast was for increasing winds out of the south. We got just past Harrington Harbor, when the winds began blowing at a steady 25 with gusts to 35. We were getting hit with 4-5 foot rollers that were washing the deck. We then decided it'd be smart to find refuge at Harrington for the night. We turned towards the Marina and made the call on the VHF. Fortunately, they had room for us and we had an enjoyable evening without the rocking and rolling.

The wind continued to blow all night. As we headed back out in the morning we were getting reports of small craft warnings. We put up the staysail and the main and proceeded to tack our way down the bay in 30 knot winds. It was rough but nothing we couldn't handle. Once we got everything tied down, the ride wasn't bad, but we weren't making much forward progress. In the early afternoon, the winds shifted and began coming out of the southwest. That gave us a near broad reach on our way back to the Solomons area. My weather alarm kept going off telling boaters to seek shelter but there is no real shelter between Herrington and Solomons. We were sailing along at about 7 knots with a minimum amount of sail up but at least now we were heading south! After running through a couple of light showers we arrived at the mouth of the Patuxent in the late afternoon. We were able to get the boat back into its slip, empty the boat of all our things and get into the garage before the approaching storm hit. It was an exhausting but wonderful trip. Once recharged we'll be ready to do it again!
