

Go To Meeting continues to be a very useful piece of software technology that allows groups to meet online. The SEOs (Squadron Education Officers) meet monthly with the District SEO and District Assistant SEO using this simple to use meeting software. The meeting leader controls the meeting, and can present Power Point slides or other material while having a conversation with the on-line members. Each group member can at any time break into the presentation for questions and comments. The person making the comment is identified at the bottom of the screen. Several courses have been offered district wide with this software.

The District ASEO recently completed a Go To Meeting session on the use of HQ800, a squadron national database that allows squadrons to make their course offering available as well as record course completions including printing certificates and ID cards. This was a big help to those of us new to the job.

FIGHTING A BOAT FIRE!

A few months ago, there was a widely reported incident in which a boat burned to the waterline. Follow-up stories noted that the boat eventually sank and presented a hazard to navigation. It was later salvaged and towed to a nearby marina.

There are a few lessons we can learn from this incident. Obviously one is to take all of the steps necessary to prevent fire. But, when a boat burns to the waterline and sinks, we can see just how horrific and all consuming a boat fire can be. Fortunately, this vessel was near land and those aboard were quickly rescued. Had the fire occurred off shore, the results might have been tragic.

The second lesson is that the Captain's first thought was to put life jackets on all crew and the third was to order them overboard. In spite of the romantic notions that a Captain must go down with his ship and/or that he must stay aboard and never give up the battle to save it; this captain did exactly the right thing by abandoning ship. It is always a tough decision to quit fighting a fire and to watch your beloved boat burn to the waterline, but, once there is any doubt about putting the fire out, cease all attempts, and get everyone overboard and as far away as possible. Do this before the fire finds any fuel aboard and explodes.

Never overestimate your ability to fight a fire on a boat. At the first sign of fire have all persons don their life jackets and have someone immediately place a distress call on VHF channel 16. At the same time, display all of your visual distress signals. Even if the fire is simply a curtain or hot pad smoldering in the galley, It is always better to err on the safe side and apologize for your actions afterwards.

A boat fire can quickly grow out of control and access to life jackets may be blocked. All hands may be too busy or panicked to stop and to call for help. Wiring may burn through, rendering all of your electronics unusable. When all hands have their life jackets on, move them to the farthest area, away from the fire. Then turn the boat in a direction that keeps the flames blowing away from those areas that are still fire free.

I believe that this month's article is more appropriate anyway.

If you are a safe Captain, you will know that the proper type of fire extinguisher to use for gasoline and alcohol is a Class B), and for electrical fires it is a Class C. You will also know the proper way to discharge the extinguisher and to aim it at the fire base with sweeping short bursts. Standing on a burning deck is not the time to learn that some extinguishers require shaking or inverting before they will function.

Fire prevention and fire emergency training is just a small portion of the lessons taught in the safe boating classes.
