

EDUCATIONAL OFFICER REPORT

Upcoming Classes

The piloting class will start on January 10, 2012 with five students and several willing instructors. We are hoping that the class will end in eight weeks but we want to teach the material thoroughly, so we will see. We have plans to teach an ABC class in February/March timeframe so it you any members of the boating know community needing the basic class, please let 1Lt Paul Davis, AP know. The date, time, and place have not be definitely set as of yet. We still have plans to teach a navigation class in May by L/TC Bob Hodgson, SN with the assistance of our instructors. What's happening at HQ?

Concerns and misconceptions have been raised regarding the priorities and direction of the Educational Department regarding classroom education, especially with regard to the alternatives of on-line and home study.

Simply stated – the primary advantage of USPS is having local squadrons and local instructors to deliver quality material to boaters. In order to get members, we need to emphasize face time with those who we train. In other words, we want people in the classroom. To illustrate, the Department Structure Committee report unanimously approved at the Greensboro Governing Board meeting clearly shows the intent of the Educational Department leadership to support classroom learning in USPS. Their position is: E090439

"The Department's highest priority is to increase the frequency of classroom courses and seminars and the number of students participating in them. Reversing the decline in classroom activity is a daunting challenge, particularly given the fact that DEOs and SEOs feel over-burdened and under-supported."

Diesel Engine Stress Test

I learned this recommendation when I took Bob Smith's diesel engine class a couple of years ago. Bob was the designer of the Lehman diesel engines, which are found in many of our trawlers today. He has long been considered the 'expert' for these engines.

This is Bob Smith's recommendation to find engine problems before they would occur naturally. Write the base number for temperatures and oil pressure down when things are running fine so you will know what is considered normal. This test should be run once per month during the boating season.

- 1. Allow diesel engine to get up to normal operating temperature.
- Run engine up to maximum RPMs for about 60 – 90 seconds. This should be about 2,500 RPMs for most engines.
- 3. Back engine off about 200 RPMs and run for about 5 minutes.
- 4. During this time, watch for temperature changes, oil pressure changes, etc.
- 5. Don't continue to run engine if black smoke occurs. This is because the engine is not capable for burning all the fuel.

The three critical temperatures are:

- 1. Engine coolant temperature (should be about 175° to 180°)
- 2. Exhaust gas temperature
- 3. Oil temperature in the base of the engine

On my boat, the only difference I see after running the test for about 5 minutes is a slight increase in coolant temperature, which is normal.

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BOATING SEASON EQUALS POTLUCK TIME

Whenever boaters get together, whether at homeport or away, food and drink always seem to be involved. Here are some ideas from the USPS cookbook, **"by land or by sea"**, geared to a small galley.

Walnut and Blue Cheese Terrine

 cup walnuts, chopped
8 oz package blue or Gorgonzola cheese, at room temperature
4 cup sour cream

Jack cheese

Lettuce leaves Granny Smith or Fuji apples, sliced Baguette, sliced, or crackers

Toast walnuts in a frying pan, or 350 degree oven for 10 minutes, until lightly browned and fragrant. Line a small loaf pan or bowl with plastic wrap, leaving a generous overhang. Break up cheese into small chunks in a bowl. Add walnuts and sour cream and mix well. Spread mixture evenly into mold and cover with overlapping wrap. Refrigerate overnight or until very firm.

To serve, unfold plastic wrap and invert onto lettuce leaf lined platter. Remove wrap. Surround with sliced apples and baguette slices and/or crackers.

Spread spinach in the bottom of a 9 x 9 x 2 inch baking dish. Combine cream cheese, milk, Jack cheese, salt, garlic salt, and $\frac{1}{4}$ cup parmesan cheese in a saucepan. Cook and stir over low heat until smooth. Pour one-half of sauce over spinach. Spread chicken over sauce. Pour remaining sauce over chicken. Sprinkle on remaining Parmesan and top with crumbs. Bake at 350 for 15 minutes, until bubbling. (Or microwave if no real oven.)
