I have had both sides of an oyster shell under my seat in the one ton since the end of August 2008. Therefore, the Oyster Shell has traveled. Hence the title "Travels of the Oyster Shell". The 2010 indicates that this is a later journey story. This is the story of our trip to Nevada City, California, for an annual family reunion at Thanksgiving. We planed to leave Hoodsport by noon on the Sunday before Thanksgiving, right after church. However, I am ahead of my story.

17th, 8 days before On the Thanksgiving, we went to North Seattle, so Joanne could see her retinal specialist. Both dogs, Rubie and Coco, acted normal as we left. When we got home, Rubie was at the door announcing our arrival while Coco was listless on the couch. The Vet was called Thursday, the 18th and Coco visited her that afternoon. She had an infection in the anal glands for which we received medications. Usually, she responds after 12 - 18 hours of first dose of Meds. However, by Friday afternoon, I had decided not to hook up the trailer until after church because Coco had not improved.

Early Saturday AM, Coco still had not improved. The Vet was visited again late Saturday morning, got more Meds and an appointment for Monday Morning.

Sunday afternoon, I got everything ready to drop the hitch on the ball and depart, safety chains hooked up, anti sway bar in position, and the weight distributing bars in place ready to tension. (It wasn't going to be that easy.)

Monday AM, we have 5¹/₂" of snow on the ground. The Olds doesn't do well in the snow. The Vet is 15 miles away. It is ¹/₂ mile to the state highway. I disconnect the safety chains, dropped the weight distributing bars, and moved the anti-sway bar and I am ready to go. Four-wheel-drive is wonderful if you need it to get out. Did I mention that our driveway is over 500 feet long? We, and everyone else, are driving slowly as we go to the Vet's.

While at the Vet, blood was drawn to see what else might be happening. We would be notified about 1000 Tuesday Morning. OK! Monday night, we lost power shortly after midnight until just before noon Tuesday. Tuesday morning I am out early. Now we have $9\frac{1}{2}$ inches of snow. It had been so cold that metal froze to metal. *Everything* is frozen. After 2 hours, I finally get all hooked up, move the truck and trailer forward about 20 feet for ease of loading passengers, and got in the house to hear the phone ring.

The Vet has called about the blood draw on Saturday. Coco has Lupus. "Unhook the trailer, we are going in to see the Vet to pick-up medications." Did I mention that the trailer electric jack had decided to freeze and not work? One hour later, I have the trailer back in position, unhooked, and am on my way to the Vet for more meds. The phone call to Nevada City was made. "We are not going south because of weather and a very sick dog." The Siskiyou Pass was accumulating snow at a significant rate. This was our trip to California this year.

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



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Spring Conference and Change of watch 25 – 26 March 2011 Kitsap Conference Center Bremerton, Washington

The District 16 Spring Conference will be held at the Kitsap Conference Center in Bremerton, Washington on 25 – 26 March, 2011. The Conference Center is located in downtown Bremerton, on the waterfront, next to the ferry terminal. Please make your Conference reservations by 1 March, to take advantage of the earlybird rates. The Hampton Inn is located adjacent to the Conference Center. If needed, additional hotel rooms will be available at the Fairfield Inn only a block away. Call Hampton Inn first, and they will help coordinate with Fairfield if necessary. The room rate for both hotels is \$99.00 per night. Please make hotel reservations prior to 10 March to ensure the contract rate. Parking will cost \$7.00 per day for those staying at the hotels. For those driving in, there is parking under the Conference Center for a small fee. Enter the parking lot at North end of Hampton Inn Suites. Breakfast is complimentary for those staying at the hotels. Breakfast for non-hotel guests is \$7.00, paid directly to the hotel. As an alternative, there are several nice restaurants close by. No officers' breakfast meetings are planned.

The Friday night reception for the Chief's Representative and dinner will be in the Fountain Room at the Puget Sound Naval Museum. It is a two story white building

located at 251 First Street right next to the ferry terminal. We will have registration set up from 1700 –1900 in the Fountain Room with the reception and dinner starting at 1800. On Saturday, the registration desk will be located in the Conference Center and be open from 0800-1000. The Conference will start at 0900 at the Center. The Saturday evening festivities will take place in the Conference Center.

We hope to make the Conference move along quickly by having many of the Officer's reports presented in writing and available for the membership to read. This will reduce the time for the business meeting and give us more time to explore other issues of interest to all members. Of course, there will be time for attendees to ask questions about the reports that are presented. Our speakers will be different this year with an emphasis on topics of interest to all. Saturday evening will be more in line with the Canadian trend of being casual, with the uniform being blazers and ties for the bridge.

Since the Conference will be held in downtown Bremerton, most places of interest are within walking distance. For example, we are having the Friday Social in the same building as the Navy Museum. The museum is one block from the Conference Center. The Port Orchard people ferry landing is next to the Washington State ferry dock. The *Turner Joy*, a Vietnam era destroyer, has been converted into a museum. It is located just north of the marina. The Puppet Museum is located at 257 4th St just east of the Bremerton Historical Museum at 289 - 4th St. All of these places are within a short walk from the Conference Center and the hotels. If that weren't enough, Anthony's Home Port Restaurant has recently opened nearby on the waterfront.

Driving Directions:

From I-5:

Take Exit #132, SR 16 (in Tacoma) toward Bremerton. Merge on to SR 3 N toward Bremerton. Take Kitsap Way exit in Bremerton. Head east toward city center on Kitsap Way. Follow signs for Seattle Ferry. Kitsap Way turns into 6th St at Wycoff. Continue on 6th St to Warren Ave. Turn right. At dead end, turn left on Burwell. Stay to right and turn right onto Pacific following signs to Ferry drop off and pickup lane. Continue toward ferry landing. The street turns into Washington Ave. Hampton Inn and Suites is on right.

From points north on Kitsap peninsula: Take SR 3 toward Bremerton and take the Kitsap Way exit. Then follow the directions above.

From the Bremerton Ferry: Take a right onto Washington Ave. Hampton Inn and Suites is on right.





"Joint Base Lewis McChord" embroidered on a shirt would take up all of it, so our March speaker Joe Piek wore JBLM on his chest. Formerly in the Army, but retired now as a Lieutenant Colonel, Joe is a civilian employee on the Base, in Public Relations. He gave us a history of the base, created in 1917 when the people of Pierce County voted, by a margin of 8 to1, to bond themselves for two million dollars to purchase 70,000 acres of land which they gave to the government for an Army Base. Within 90 days of when the first staff arrived, there were 757 buildings built and 422 other structures. The airfield was opened in 1930 and in 1947 became a part of the new U S Air Force. The two entities operated independently for over 60 years, before being joined together in 2010.

How big is this new organization? More than I would have estimated. There are about 46,000 military personnel, 53,000 dependents, and 13,000 civilian workers. Wikipedia tells me that 120,000 military retirees use Madigan Medical Services. So do new babies, six new babies every day!

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TRAWLER FEST

Once again Passage Maker Magazine brings Trawler Fest and Trawler Fest University to the Northwest. This year's event takes place in Anacortes in May, 10 and 11 for the University and 12 through 14 for the boat show and seminars. A new benefit this year for Power Squadron members is that all of the University classes earn credit for the Boat Operators Certificate that USPS is now awarding. Here's an opportunity to accomplish two goals with one educational experience, get more valuable information and build credits toward your BOC.

The workshops this year include one on diesel engines, provided by the developer of the Lehman Ford diesel engine, with both theory and "hands-on basic engine preventive and maintenance procedures" which all diesel owners should know, and "repair", which I'm more than willing to leave to the experts.

Well-known writer on all things boat related, Steve D'Antonio, will teach a new course on "Bringing the Fun Back to Boat Ownership". I don't know if he has any influence over fuel prices, but even if not, learning how to "make your boat more reliable, less costly (maybe he does have!), and safer", especially when customized for each student, should make summer cruising much less worrisome and much more enjoyable.

"Women's-only Boat Handling", with its "hands-on approach to boating principles, techniques, and applications of proper and safe navigation" should make life happier for women who understand the potential in every boat trip of having to move into the job of skipper, or who just want to learn more from someone who doesn't yell. (Remember that old story from Seattle about how half the divorce attorneys would be out of work if the Ballard Locks were removed.)

One class is already wait-listed, "Building Cruising Confidence as a Couple". Nicely alliterative, it's a class I think should be taken after W B H has boosted a woman's boating know-how. "Learning to formulate a plan and effectively communicate together" is a good idea in relationships in all circumstances, not just cruising. It's good to learn "what works in the real world", but as for "what does not", we've undoubtedly already learned that on our own!

The ninety minute seminars given on Fest days include "Confessions of a Galley Slave", which sounds like fun and is applicable to land-based situations as well. Bob Sweet, author of The Weekend Navigator, essential reading for our advanced classes, will have a session on anchoring. This should be valuable for members who join the post-Rendezvous cruise to Campbell River, as most nights on the way will be spent at anchor. Then move on to "Practical Considerations for Spare-Parts Outfitting", another valuable resource for summer cruisers, for you just never know....

"Bringing Satcom Costs Down to Earth" may not be essential for Sound cruisers, but there's nothing wrong with wishful thinking. The same wishful thinking goes for "Financing the Boat of Your Dreams". We all know what we'd like (for Paul, radar and a stainless steel arch; for me, a real oven, not just a microwave; an island bed, easy to make; a bit more salon room, for my paperback books and needlepoint; and for both of us, yes, Steve D'Antonio, cheaper fuel), and we all know that, short of a major Powerball win, it ain't gonna happen.

When classes are over, there will be many boats to see, compare, and lust for, and Anacortes is fun place to visit. We enjoyed our over-night at Cap Sante Boat Haven last summer, at the best docking spot in the marina, i.e., shortest walk to the laundry room.

Marine Battery and Charging Systems by Gary Ball

When designing a battery and charging system for your boat, there are three major battery types to consider. The first are flooded batteries, which use a liquid medium to carry electrolyte between the battery plates. The second are gel batteries, which rely on gelatinous silica slurry to suspend the electrolyte conductor, which surrounds the battery's plates. The third are AGM batteries that use a matting of densely packed fiberglass material to hold electrolyte in suspension between the battery plates.

There are pros and cons for the different battery technologies. Wet-cells (flooded batteries) potentially last longer and cost less. They are tolerant of abuse, including overcharges. They are slow to recharge. If charge times are limited, the total cost of energy produced can be relatively high.

Gel-Cells and AGMs may cost more and potentially have a shorter life. They are sensitive to overcharging. They charge faster and if charge times are limited, this helps reduce the total cost for the energy produced

Wet-cells need periodic equalization, which requires a specialized regulator. Gassing occurs near full charge, which can cause an explosive risk. Their terminal voltage falls under heavy loads.

Gel-cells and AGMs do not require equalization but a specialized regulator is advised. No gassing occurs in normal circumstances and the terminal voltage holds up better under heavy loads.

Wet-cells are position-sensitive. They can't be mounted on their sides or upside-down. They will vent chlorine gas if submerged. They have a high rate of selfdischarge and require regular maintenance. Gel-Cells and AGMs are not position-sensitive. They can even be upsidedown and can be submerged safely. They have a low rate of self-discharge and require little maintenance.

The first step to designing a battery system is to calculate the power requirements of the boat. Second is to determine the necessary battery storage capacity. Third is to install adequate charging capabilities and establish correct voltage regulation levels to maintain system. Finally, we should install a good monitoring system.

requirements Calculating power means determining the number of amphours used daily. 1 amp for 10 hours is 10 amp-hrs and 100 amps for 5 minutes (.08hours) is 8 amp-hrs. Add up amp-hours (Ah) for all loads on the boat, which refrigeration, includes lights, fans. electronics, pumps, inverter, etc. An amphour meter makes this real easy. For our example, let's assume we use 100 Ah per day.

To determine the size of the battery bank, we need to know how often you are going to use the engine. Motoring every day will mean we need to put back (charge) 100 Ah every day. Motoring every other day will mean we need to put back or charge 200 Ah (or twice the capacity).

How far do you want to discharge your batteries? Discharging 100% leaves no emergency reserve and is very hard on the battery. Discharging to 50% is easy on the battery and helps good batteries last many years. If we need 100 Ah and we discharge the battery to the 50% level, we need a 200 Ah battery.

How high are you going to charge the batteries when you motor? Discharged batteries can be charged relatively quickly to 70% to 80% of fully-charged level. Assuming we discharge to 50% and recharge to 80%, we are using 30% of the battery's capacity. Therefore we need about 333 Ah battery capacity. (100 Ah \div 0.3 = 333 Ah) This provides a good balance of battery life, recharge time and cost.

Next, consider the age factor. As batteries age, capacity decreases. Let's add a fudge factor of 20%. For your boat using 100 Ah daily and utilizing 30% of battery capacity implies a 333 Ah battery. Adding 20% fudge factor brings the capacity to about 400 Ah, which is about the capacity of two 8D-sized batteries in parallel.

One final check is to ensure that the highest sustainable load is no more than 25% of the capacity of the battery bank. Assume your microwave oven on the inverter uses 90 Amps. Therefore your battery bank needs to be at least 360 Ah. (90 $\div 0.25 = 360$)

If batteries are going to be deeply discharged, or engine-time needs to be kept to a minimum, we need a BIGGER alternator! Typical boat alternators are 50 to 70 amp but their real output is probably much lower!

There are four critical factors for choosing the alternator; the mounting configuration, size of the drive belt, battery size and technology. There are four alternator mounting configurations; 1" Single-Foot (Motorola style), 2" Single-Foot (Delco style), 3.15" I.D. Dual-Foot (Hitachi style) and 4" I.D. Dual-Foot (J-180 style).

The determining factor in sizing the alternator is normally the maximum current the batteries can absorb without damage, which is called the *charge acceptance rate*. The alternator should have an output level of 25% (wet cells) to 40% (gel cells or AGM) of the Ah rating of the battery bank.

For our example of a 400 Ah battery, the alternator should output between 100 amps and 160 amps (25% to 40% of capacity). We need to distinguish between "real" output and rated output. In many cases, output will decline by 25% at elevated temperatures.

To establishing correct voltage regulation requires using a multistep regulator with different phases; *bulk* charge, *absorption* charge, *float* charge and *Equalization* charge.

Bulk charge is where maximum alternator current output is maintained until battery comes up to about 14.2 to 14.4 volts. The current is more or less constant, but not always. The bulk charge restores about 75% of charge.

The absorption charge is where the alternator current is decreased while output voltage is held to 14.2 to 14.4 volts. This is a constant-voltage charge and continues until charge current declines to 2% of battery's amp-hour rating, which are about 8 amps in our example. At its termination, a battery will be very nearly fully charged.

If absorption phase were to continue beyond fully charged state, the battery would be damaged. The regulator detects this and goes to float charge, which is a lower constant-voltage float setting of about 13.2 to 13.4 volts. It can be left here indefinitely.

Some regulators have an equalization (conditioning) charge, which is essential for obtaining the maximum life expectancy from wet-cell deep-cycle batteries. Sulfation is a problem for batteries that are repeatedly discharged and never brought back to 100% state of charge. After the battery is completely charged, hold charging current to 3% to 4% of battery capacity for 2 - 3 hours (about 12 to 16 amps in our example). Do not do this for gel-cells or AGM batteries!

Add a good monitoring system, which should be able to monitor individual battery voltages to 0.01 volt, amps going into (charging) or out of (discharging) each battery and amp-hours used from each battery.

Some other things to consider are temperature compensation where at higher temperatures, charging voltages need to be lowered.

Some good numbers to remember (on rested wet-cell batteries) are 12.70 volts is fully charged and 12.20 volts is about 50%

WHALES

Once upon a time, long, long ago, an itinerant and aging 35 ton whale grounded on the north shore of Jefferson County, Washington. The citizens of San Juan de Fuca stood amazed at the whale's sheer bulk. At first, they realized that the male whale had not gone out with the receding tide but, had in fact, expired.

After a day or so of being newsworthy, and a local phenomenon, they realized they had a high price to pay for their entertainment, especially since their community was essentially downwind. Most seriously disturbed was the landowner-baron, upon whose beach the wayward denizen of the deep had come to rest.

SPRING CONFERENCE IN BREMERTON

The weather cooperated to make this a really good conference, one of the best Paul and I have attended. The Hotel and Conference Center overlook the Bremerton marina. The Coast Guard representative was the first person to speak, telling us about the push for enhanced federal rules and enforcement for boating. including mandatory PFDs to be worn when on any boat under 18 feet, and federal boater education requirements and "card". Time was saved for invited speakers having many committee reports bv presented in written form. Some facts and figures briefly: The treasurer finds our finances in good shape and our budget, barring a financial tsunami, an accurate predictor of the year's income and expenses. Vessel Safety Checks

Complementary Vessel Safety Checks (VSC's) were offered at Olympia Yacht Club on April 23, 2011. Twenty two boat inspections were completed by Sail Olympia and Power Squadron inspectors. Thanks are given to the boat owners participating and to the inspectors for providing their time and expertise. Vessel Examiners were Pat Brower. Jim Hanson, Jim Harden, Debbie Harden, Viki Sharp and Skip Hash. We had SUN and a great turn out.

months, it takes a lot more planning than for a trip to the San Juan or Gulf Islands. There are three major items that need to be planned around: yourself and your spouse, your home and finally the boat.

When it comes to preparing yourself, the major issues are probably related to healthcare. You should not leave until you have had your annual medical and dental checkups. A medical or dental problem that could have been prevented is not what you need when you are several days away from help. You need to insure that your prescriptions are filled for the length of time you will be gone.

Using bill-pay services through your bank or brokerage account is a great way to solve the bill paying issue. You may want to think about how you are going to communicate with family and loved ones at home. Cell phone coverage is very limited and Internet service is probably limited to larger marinas. Bottom-line; don't count on it very often.

You need to arrange who will take care of the house and yard maintenance. Since the post office will only hold mail for 30 days, you will need to temporarily forward your mail for the duration of your trip. Putting utilities on vacation hold may be a good idea. If Comcast is your Internet provider, you may choose to leave your Internet active but stop the TV. That way you can access your email through the web at times during your trip. Finally, remember to disconnect those car batteries. If you don't, it is likely you will not be able to start your cars upon returning home until you apply a charge to the batteries.

Now, let's talk about the boat. You need to carry paper charts (at least 1:75,000) of all the areas to be cruised. Computers do and will fail. Some excellent cruising publications include: Waggoner Cruising Guide, Ports and Passes, Douglass's books, Inside Passage Route Planning Maps, and The Burgee – Premier Marina Guidebook.

Anchoring up north can be a challenge at times. Expect to anchor in deeper water. If you use chain plus nylon rode, try for two times your boat length in chain and 450 feet of total chain plus nylon rode. If you use all chain, try for a minimum of 300 feet. You should expect to stern tie at times. 400 feet of polypropylene line works great for this.

When it comes to preventative maintenance on the boat, make sure all problems are fixed before you leave home. Problems never seem to just go away. Make sure your batteries are in good shape. They will get worked hard during an extended Before leaving home, routine trip. maintenance should include changing the oil and all fuel filters, new saltwater pump impellers, clean heat exchangers, ensuring the head works great and replacing any worn engine hoses.

Carrying spare parts and tools is very dependent on your mechanical capability and storage area. As a minimum, you should carry spare fuel filters, extra oil, transmission fluid, anti-freeze, distilled water, alternator belts, zincs, engine hoses and a rebuild kit for the head. It is not easy to get specific parts for your boat up north and flying them in gets very expensive.

You should carry manuals for all your boat systems as well as phone numbers for key repair technicians back home. These numbers can be invaluable at times.

Before leaving home, think of backup plans for different failures on the boat. These might include failures of the windlass, toilet, macerator, stove and fresh water pump.

Preparing the galley is one of the most challenging jobs. Supplies are limited up north and they are expensive. A vacuum sealer is a nice accessory to carry, if you have room. Boxed milk is very handy. It can be stored the entire summer and does not have to be refrigerated until opened. The green "Debbie" vegetable bags are useful for extending the life of fresh fruit and vegetables. It is a good idea to create an inventory list of what food is located on the boat and maybe the storage location.

When you travel north you will experience many things that you have not seen before. One of those is tannin water. It is not bad water. It just does not look appetizing. It comes from the tannin in all the cedar trees. Large tides over 20 feet are quite common. You will experience fast currents in narrow passages, which is why it is most important to travel these at slack. Currents don't always match the tables. This is especially true in the spring due to the large amounts of fresh-water runoff from snow melting and entering the water via waterfalls. You will probably have to deal with lots of commercial fishing boats and gill nets. Keep a sharp lookout. Rain and fog are very common, even in the middle of summer. Radar is very important. Don't be surprised if you see whole trees floating in the water. Landslides into the water are not uncommon.

If you are planning a trip north, don't hesitate to ask others who have done the trip for their tips. Traveling north of Desolation Sound is a wonderful boating experience and you don't have to have a large yacht to enjoy this trip.

TIME TO THINK RENDEZVOUS

Elsewhere in the Log you should find an information form and a registration form for the District Rendezvous, once again to be held in Poulsbo, June 24-26. DXO Travis Smith and PDC Joanna

Webster have picked as the theme "Rock & Roll "60s". I think we can all relate to that, in one way or another. Some things will remain the same: Boat Operator Certification stuff: fire extinguisher and flare practice; Sea Scouts doing the opening ceremony; Saturday afternoon better boating seminar; Saturday evening dinner, barbecue at the Sons of Norway Hall, please bring a dessert to share; and a silent auction for which our Squadron already has а contribution prepared.

Some things are different: Friday night we'll have a "Docktail Party" on E dock, sharing hors d'oeuvres in a companionable cooking competition, I expect. USPS Youth Poster Contest entries will be on display at the rendezvous, although the time schedule for this event has changed, and later submissions still can be made, as voting on the posters will take place at the Fall Conference.

As usual with District gatherings, there's no registration fee, but there is a five-dollar dock space reservation fee. Land-locked boaters: If you want to stay overnight, there are nice motels in Poulsbo. If you're a day-tripper only, there are plenty of comfortable chairs on the docks or in the boats, and all District 16 members are welcome, even when no longer active boaters. Come and have fun!

Who, What, When & Where <u>Docking</u>: We'll have our Tacoma Squadron's Docking Specialists again this year, who will be assisting in the arrival of boats for docking. Everybody is required to call in on VHF 72, prior to entering the marina. Even if you do not wish assistance in docking, please inform the docking crew you have arrived.

<u>Registration:</u> Friday and Saturday, rendezvous checkin will be at the Multi Purpose Room (MPR) located at the entrance to "E" dock. Times for registration will be posted on front of the building. You must send in the \$5.00 dock reservation fee (non-refundable) with your reservation to ensure that you will have a confirmed slip. The remainder of your moorage fees (for your entire stay), must be paid directly to the Port of Poulsbo, i.e., **not to District 16**. Please check in on **VHF 72** when your boat arrives at the marina. The reservation for your meals and moorage must be received by **11 June 2011**. No guarantees for the Four-Star BBQ dinner or dock space after this date.

Boat Operator Certifier Qualification: BOC qualification and training will be available for both Inland and Coastal Navigator. Sign up now as space is limited.

Inland Navigation: Inland certifiers will be available on Thursday, 23 June, and Friday, 24 June, to witness power boat handling skill demonstrations and sign off on passports for this level. If there is a need, training may be available on Wednesday, 22 June. This training will be similar to last year's program. It takes about three to four hours to complete the training.

Coastal Navigator: Coastal certifiers will be available Thursday, 23 June, and Friday, 24 June, to witness navigation and boat handling skill demonstrations. Note: Inland navigator on-the-water skill demonstrations must be completed first. This demonstration takes about five hours and is performed in the candidate's own vessel. If you want to receive credit for either Inland or Coastal Navigator, <u>you need to obtain an Inland or Coastal</u> <u>Navigator Candidate Kit by ordering through your SEO, prior to the class.</u>


PASSPORT TO PUGET SOUND



COMMANDER'S MESSAGE

Life is full of surprises, and Monday night was full of life! As we drove in to the OYC parking lot, we saw the big sign on the front steps to "USE SIDE ENTRANCE". One of the double doors was propped open, and the space behind it was filled with plastic sheeting. What's going on?

As good stewards, even when they have vacated the job, the Schnatterlys were there first and related that a member said that maintenance was going on so we couldn't use the place, and "Gee, too bad nobody called you." Really now! Half the floor was covered with plastic that we weren't to walk on, the burgee display was taken down, with part on the floor and part on two long tables, and things were in general disarray. Still, there was room for tables to be set up, and member Robbie Robinson arrived to help with that. The lectern was found and set up on the starboard beam. The summer potluck got underway, and Deanna came to me and said that there weren't any switches for the lights. All the covers had been removed and only wires were visible, stuffed in the boxes. Who knew when the meeting might end if we held it after the program, which might meaning meeting in the dark. So dinner and meeting coincided. (Fortunately the restroom lights were still operable.)

Vivian Eason <u>easonv@co.thurston.wa.us</u>, with county's emergency management team, gave us some good news: down here at the end of the Sound, we should be safe from any trans-oceanic tsunamis. She shared a personal insight, that even with all her training and experience in the field, she's still afraid of earthquakes. They come without warning, and one doesn't know where they might hit. Still, it's possible to be prepared. For instance: put a pair of sturdy shoes, old ones are fine; a hard hat; a flashlight with batteries stored outside of the light; a whistle; and work gloves in a bag to keep under your bed. To be super safe, have a bag at work as well.

She handed out bags that have a predisaster shopping list on them and helpful information in them, including a whistle and a 24 week chart for building up a 3 to 7 day supply kit with food, water, and first-aid supplies, and for developing a plan to respond to the event by turning off water and gas, getting family members together, and selecting an out of area contact person. There's even advice for providing supplies for your pets.

The bag also included a copy of the state's Emergency Resource Guide, with web site addresses for state emergency management, <u>www.emd.wa.gov</u> and the state health department, <u>www.doh.wa.gov</u>. If you weren't present, you can get your own bag and helpful information from the county: <u>www.co.thurston.wa.us/em</u> and 360-754-3360 for general information look up <u>www.WhoDependsOnYou.com</u>.

It was a good meeting, with favorite summer dishes at the potluck and members dressed for warm weather fun, including two in scanty bikinis. It was a pleasure to arrive and depart in daylight! Be sure to check the article by our new Admin Officer, Dalia Lavender, for information on our summer rendezvous. She has good things planned for July and August that you won't want to miss. 

DO YOU LIKE BARBECUE?

On our boating vacation, we spent our last night in the Bremerton marina. I treated Paul to a wonderful lunch. milkshakes at the Coldstone Creamery, and he reciprocated by getting dinner. In that sentence "getting" means purchasing, not preparing. He bought us barbecue from Bugaloo's which is located on the waterfront promenade, between the Seattle ferry dock and the USS Turner Joy. This is convenience for boaters staying in the marina overnight, and for drop-in waterfront visitors, as the marina provides a big number of tables and chairs for picnickers along the promenade.

The sign on the food building says "Voted #1 in Western WA". We were happy to give it a test. Portions are large, and one dinner serves two. If you can't agree on which meat to choose, get a combo dinner and make both diners happy. Parking is available nearby in both Bremerton and Port Orchard. You can go to either place and ride the passenger ferry across, have a walk through old town Pt O, eat in Bremerton while watching the big ferries and - if you're lucky - the Orcas in Sinclair Bay. Authentic accompaniments available for your BBQ include sweet potato pie and ice-cold sweetened iced tea.

You can have a picnic without doing any work, and a pleasant day out at a time of your own choosing. The food shop is open seven days a week from 10 AM to 8 PM Sun through Thurs, to 9:00 PM on Fri and Sat. If you're there when the marina offices are open, be sure to look in and see the Olympia Sail & Power Squadron burgees on display in both ports.

Message Relay from Recreational Boating Association of Washington (RBAW):

Subject: USCG ALERT -- SHOALING IN THE SWINOMISH CHANNEL

Greetings,

This message is sent on behalf of the Captain of the Port Puget Sound to alert all boaters regarding shoaling in the Swinomish Channel. This information was provided in a Local Notice to Mariners, but since recreational boats are grounding on the shoals, we are putting this information out again for general distribution and posting in area marinas. The Local Notice to Mariners follows:

WASHINGTON - STRAIT OF JUAN DE FUCA TO STRAIT OF GEORGIA -SWINOMISH CHANNEL - Reported shoaling

Numerous soundings of shoaling in the Swinomish Channel have been reported. The primary locations for the shoaling have been from the Swinomish Channel South Entrance, north to the vicinity of La Conner, WA.

Some depths have been reported as two (2) feet less than the charted depths. Mariners are advised to use caution when transiting this waterway due to the reported shoaling. *****

We also remind boaters to monitor the tides closely (the controlling depth for the channel is less than 5.5 - 6 ft). Some of the shoaling is near the center of this narrow waterway.

Kindly note that the US Coast Guard Navigation Center has an excellent site where you can sign up to have the Local Notice to Mariners e-mailed to you when it comes out every week. That site is: (http://www.navcen.uscg.gov/?pageName=1 nmDistrict®ion=13).

We thank marina organizations for notifying their members, and marina managers for posting this alert and advising boaters heading this way to take extra caution transiting the Swinomish Channel.





<u>FROM THE BRIDGE</u> COMMANDER'S MESSAGE

Halloween is what I'm thinking of as I write this, both our General Meeting in October and the fun night to come. Rick and Deanna Schnatterly came in costume and Judy Ball had a festive sweater that honored the occasion. No actual fingers on any of the finger food platters, but Judy's stuffed eggs really did look like overworked eyeballs, bleary and red veined. The eighteen of us present had a great social hour, wished Pete Peterson a Happy Birthday, and assembled for a very brief meeting.

Our principal topic that evening was what to do about diminishing membership numbers. How do we fulfill our purpose of boating education, of making boaters more knowledgeable, which makes everybody on the water safer? Our Chief Commander, Frank Dvorak says, "Membership is job one." The purpose of increasing membership is to involve people who are advocates of safe and knowledgeable boating, add them to our classes, and then to our teaching team.

At the Fall Conference there was a session labeled "Membership Demographics", a program prepared by USPS. I often think that people living east of the Mississippi River don't think like those living west of it, but there were enough ponderable points in the presentation that I would like to use it for our January meeting. More worthwhile to District 16 and its constituent Squadrons was the follow-up, a marketing presentation done by Bill Monroe of the Bellevue Squadron. Marketing is his business, and he tasked us to consider who our target customers are and to find out what they are seeking.

Do you know that there's a Texas company which advertises in Washington that it's the official Washington state boater's exam company? What would one get from it, for \$20? What more do we have to offer? We have information about boating safety, know-how, fun, lifestyle, community, all from experienced boaters with local knowledge.

He also critiqued the District and Squadron web sites. He noticed that the home pages feature pictures of people, holding plaques, eating, standing around. Why aren't there pictures of water, boats, people having fun with them? Good question. It would be great if we could get his presentation for our January meeting as well. D/Cdr Hank Willis has appointed a marketing committee to be chaired by Christine Rasmussen. Getting the Squadrons to work together in promoting the organization will be a major goal.

There was also a guest speaker discussing and demonstrating (within reason) marine sanitation. I usually leave the hi-tech boat stuff to my crew, but a good, working system is so important (see D/Cdr Hank's report on the District Cruise) that I paid attention. Now I know how to keep the holding tank bacteria healthy and happy . . . and odor free. Thank you, Chris Piel!

One monetary item that I want to mention is the inclusion in the budget of \$250 to cover the deductible for any member's boat damaged while used for on the water training. There hasn't been such an event in our District, but the BOC committee wanted this covered just in case.

As I had anticipated, there was a report from the Planning Committee and some discussion about revamping the District's meeting schedule, condensing the spring events, relying more on electronic communication. and having council electronically members vote between scheduled meetings. There needs to be much more discussion of this before any made. including changes are an understanding of what the national bylaws will allow the District to do.

As always, fellowship was good, and it's fun to share and compare with the folks from other Squadrons. Never pass up an opportunity to learn from others' successes.



Marine Toilet Paper - by Gary Ball

Have you ever wondered why it costs so much to buy marine toilet paper? Have you wondered if you really needed to use it? Well, I have, and I decided to run a little experiment.

I decided to run an experiment comparing a major brand of marine toilet paper sold at West Marine with the Kirkland brand sold at Costco. I took one square of each and placed it in a glass. I added 8 ounces of water to each glass. I let each glass stand for 24 hours. At the end of the 24 hour period, I took a spoon and stirred each glass a half dozen times.

I had expected that the marine toilet paper would fall apart more than the Kirkland brand but I was surprised. After stirring each glass, I used the spoon to lift the sheet of toilet paper out of the glass. The marine paper tore but was able to be lifted from the glass. The Costco brand not only tore easier but fell apart more as it was lifted. Looking into the water in the glass, there was far more small shreds of paper in the glass holding the Costco brand.

Now, this is not a totally scientific experiment. I have concluded that the Costco Kirkland brand of toilet paper should be able to be used in a marine sanitation system. It certainly costs less than the name brand marine toilet paper.

A future experiment might include using salt water instead of fresh water, or even seeing the difference when adding chemicals or enzymes to the water. Stay tuned.
